Kavita Sidhu – what do we need to know about her? What are the essentials?

"I started my modelling career at 14 while I was still in school and by the time I was 18, I was working internationally in Paris and Europe. I took a break from it to finish my studies in Australia, after which I got into acting. I still do both and I've done about six or seven films. Right now I've just finished a TV drama and I'm going to do a TV show and I am in the midst of planning for the next film. Apart from that, I'm also a producer, for the company that I work for, so I do a lot of behind-the-scenes, create proposals and prepare concepts for TV shows and films. We are always on the lookout for fresh unique ideas and projects.

"In 2010, I founded my own fashion label under my namesake brand, 'Kavita'. We came up with many different names, and in the end we just decided, 'Oh, let's just go with your name.'

"I debuted my Resort collection at the Stylo Fashion Week 2010 and various fashion weeks since then. I was elated when I first saw my collection from windows of famous stores! I was stocking my brand at M store at the Gardens Mall and in Bali.

"I now sell my ready-to-wear collection online, on an Indian website called IndianRoots, part of the New Delhi TV group which has an impressive database of customers from all over the world. I am the first Malaysian designer on this online fashon site along with top Indian and Bollywood designers. It's great exposure for me as a designer and I am truly humbled! You can also view my collection on my website www.kavitasidhu.com and on my Instagram @kavita_sidhu."

Oh, congratulations!

"Thanks!" she answered with a bright smile. "You should see the website, it's got beautiful stuff. Very modern with a heritage element to a lot of the designs. I am expanding early next year and looking to open my own physical store. So that really is excitina!"

Let's talk about your roots.

"I was born in England, but I grew up in Malaysia. I spent a huge part of my life in Malaysia, with the exception of studying abroad in Australia. I go to London quite often, not so much for work but for workshops, festival markets and holidays because my brother works there."

What about Zenzero Restaurant?

"I have a small partnership with this restaurant since the end of 2013, with my brother and two other partners. We've got an Italian partner, and he runs the place. We have a great Italian chef who makes authentic Italian dishes with a Mediterranean twist to some of the dishes. It's private and elegant for discerning diners. And above all, value for your money which is really important to us."

So was it always your dream to be a beauty queen? Or was it by chance?

"Absolutely by chance!" she said, shaking her head while laughing in disbelief. "I was a real tomboy in school. I was into sports. I was a state high jumper, and I trained everyday. I played hockey, I did all the games, I was even sports captain. I have a district record in high jumping, and I love athletics and sports.

"I think I was 13 when I started modelling – really young and still in school. I was discovered by an advertising agency and the agent called me up and said that they were doing a commercial and they were looking for a high jumper. It was so funny because one of my first commercials was for Milo, and they were casting at my school for the sports team. So they called me and that was how I got in.

And do you know Faridah Merican and Joe Hasham? Faridah was the producer and Joe was the director. Il am friends with them until today, and they constantly say, 'Kavita, we were the ones who saw you the first time!' So that was how it started "

What's the story behind Miss Charm International 1990 then?

"I was just asked to represent Malaysia. I was modelling at the time already, I'd gone to Paris and come back. So when I did Miss Charm, which was in Russia, my mum came with me. She was always there for every modelling show and assignment. So we flew there, and I won the contest.I got quite a bit of recognition for being the first Malaysian to win an international

beauty pageant and that certainly helped propel my modelling career to greater heights. It was important that I leveraged on opportunities like that and I ran with it!

"Imagine, I didn't expect to win at all!"

Looking back, what do you think made you win?

At this she shrugged and genuinely looked puzzled, then said, "I have no idea, really! It was nice that the Russians appreciated our beauty. At the time, especially, I would never imagine that because there were so many blonde girls and all these different beauties. It was very hard because I wouldn't say that I don't agree with beauty contests, but it's really so subjective. How can you say that this girl is prettier than that girl? I was uncomfortable, I have to say, throughout the whole pageant. I just did it as more of a project or a job, and never was it an aspiration for me but more a stepping stone to achieve more and to make my country proud."

Now that you went and did it, what was your fondest memory about it?

"Russia was amazing. Leningrad, Moscow were absolutely awesome. The girls were awesome. It was very sad to see Russia at the time because it was a very closed market. I think they'd just come out of communist rule a year later, if I'm not mistaken.


"I remember the Miss Russia contest, which was going on at the same time I was there, and I remember the girl who got second place – she was crying, but she was so beautiful! In the end, however, she got sent to represent Russia for the Miss Universe pageant and got placed within the top 5 or top 10. To them, it was a way out of their poverty and their hard lives.

"But I think the girls were lovely, and there was this whole sisterhood bonding thing that was going on, which was nice. None of those backstabbing, horrible girls you see on TV shows! In all my experience in modelling, it was never like that. The models are the nicest people and they're all very supportive of each other. Maybe a certain amount of competitiveness but never mean-spirited."

What was your experience like when you were modelling in Paris?

Her eyes lit up as she recalled, "That was the best! I mean I was very determined, and that was when I was 18, and it was my own initiative. I had my portfolio done. Now it's very different as agencies and affiliations are connected. I won Model of the Year here, and I got to do a fashion shoot in Paris. I remember the feeling of going, 'Oh my God, I can't believe I'm in Paris!' It was just something else. But I think it was dangerous, you know, for a young girl to be in a foreign country on her own, which was what I did. But God was looking after me, and I had a great agent who was like a mother to us all. I worked with some top French and American designers and it was an amazing experience.

After a while, I decided to return here, because my parents are both doctors and they said, 'You know what, you need to study and get your degree.' And I absolutely agreed. It was a tough life you know, being so young and having to go to the agency

and getting my hips measured everyday! You can't put on like, half a centimetre even. It was so precise and the pressure was crazy for a young girl. I think that's why most of them become anorexic or get into drugs. I am so against super skinny models that you see on runways. When I hire models for my runway shows or photo shoots, I always ask for the curvier girls as they carry my dresses so much better. Curvy is sexy!"

You've starred in a couple of movies, and you were the lead for Mimpi Moon. How did that experience change your perception on acting and producer?

"The year before Mimpi Moon, I had actually produced and hosted my first TV show for Astro in 1999. But yes, with Mimpi Moon, I had my first lead role in a feature film and I think the director, Datin Paduka Shuhaimi Baba believed in me enough to give me the lead role in a Malay film, which doesn't happen too often. There was a lot of pressure, but I think I did the best I could. It did fairly well in the box office, and it garnered five awards at the Malaysian

Film Festival then. It was a good experience and sobering, as I realised how so much pure hard work, discipline and passion go behind the scenes. It just made me want to learn more about acting. That was my break into the film industry and I'm here to stay 15 years on!"

What about your brand – Kavita. Have you always wanted to become a fashion designer?

"I never thought I would, even though I had dreams of it as I've always loved fashion and design. I was always sketching and designing, and I started making my own clothes from my mum's saree collection. I still have them! My observation as a model really helped – doing so many shows and such, I wished I could change something about the designs. I've always wanted to have my own fashion line, but I wasn't sure what category I wanted to start off with."

What's the inspiration behind the Kavita and where do you normally get the ideas from?

"I think a lot of it has got to do with travel. I have in mind the woman who loves to travel, easy dressing, beautiful silks ... I use a lot of Italian silks. The idea is for dresses that would make a woman feel beautiful, no matter her shape and size. When I first started out, my friends said, 'Oh please, Kavita, I can never wear your dresses, they're only going to fit you!' And I said, 'No! If you look at the stuff I make, any shape can wear it. It's loose but you can still have your waist!' That's important to me – to flatter a woman's body as best as possible, rather than just make things that are so difficult for a woman to wear. Even I get uncomfortable sometimes. There are some days when you feel bloated! That's just something I really try to focus on, on how I can make women feel and look beautiful and sexy at the same time without overdoing it by showing too much "

On the other hand how would you describe your personal style, though?

"Jeans. Pants. And shirt! Oh my God, this!" she laughed while pointing at her current attire. "Easy-going, for sure. I like to look well put together. But I love pants. They're comfortable. I love a lot of silk shirts but I love to wear dresses too. I have a tomboy kind of thing going on with a dash of femininity.

"What I've discovered is that it's all about your mindset, how you feel about yourself. I've been in dresses that I'm uncomfortable in, and it shows. You just have got to pretend that you look amazing and it really makes a difference!"

So, personal life! What's up, what's been going on? Are you seeing anyone?

"Yes, I have a boyfriend," she said with a cheeky smile. "We've been dating for a few years. It's looking good. There may be some news soon, but I wont tell you yet!"

Any advice for budding fashion designers or for those who'd like to reach for the stars like yourself?

"I know a lot of people are unsure of what they want to do, especially when they're younger. You just don't know which path in life to take. That also happened to me. But whatever it is that you're doing right now, do the best you can. And something will come out of it. Something will happen. Commit to it and stay the course. The younger generation are not too bad, they have great ideas, but I do find some do not commit enough time nor energy to make it a success. You've got to be realistic and experience counts for so much, right? You need to know your stuff and be good at it."

Describe your life in a nutshell.

"I guess I'm an independent girl. I'm very close with my family, always busy and I'm constantly looking to challenge myself. I'm a bit different, I chose a different path and I try to do my best."

If you could change one thing about your life right now, what would it be?

"I wish I would have saved more money, really. When you think about it, I've started working since I was 13, and I wish I had put aside maybe 20% of my income as savings for a rainy day! But it seems there is always a rainy day around the corner!"

We have to ask this question – how in the world do you manage to look this great?!

"Of course there's the eating well and exercise thing but I think you need to be happy. Finding your happiness is imperative. All of us go through ups and downs and I always surround myself with positive and encouraging people. If you don't try to look at the positive side of things, it will show on your face. You don't shine and you don't glow.

"But besides that, diet and exercise of course. I eat loads, I don't starve myself but I need to watch my carb intake! I'm almost a vegetarian because I still have fish and seafood. I do yoga, and I go to the gym. I think you need to do weights and resistance training, especially for women. So I do that. Lots of water, I carry a bottle with me all the time. Multivitamins, no late-partying, no alcohol and plenty of sleep! Everyone says I sleep too much but I love my naps, but you know what, I don't care! You need to sleep! It rejuvenates you."

E-Plus and fans alike are extremely excited that they have decided to perform the final leg of this World Tour in Malaysia," said Andrew Ching, founder of E-Plus.

The concert will be held at One World Hotel, Bandar Utama on Saturday, 5 December 2015 at 8.00 pm.

British-born singer-songwriter and guitarist Graham Russell and lead vocalist Russell Hitchcock, conquered the world with eight Top Ten hit songs in the United States during the early 1980s including Lost in Love, All Out of Love and The One That You Love. In 2013, the band was inducted into the Hall of Fame of the Australian Recording Industry Association (ARIA) for their music and contribution to the industry.

"We're just trying to enjoy the show by giving our fans the songs they have identified us with through the years... actually, we're more than excited," said 66-year-old Russell Charles Hitchcock.

"All our audience had been great. They have the full mastery of almost all our songs," added Graham Russell, 62.

Asked what it was that they loved best about performing, they replied, "It's connecting with the people who come to see us. They expect a certain thing. They want to hear some music that means a lot to them. It's an evening with the audience coming together and

creating something really lovely, having a great night that people don't forget, and that's what it's all about."

Russell and Hitchcock met on May 12, 1975. It was the first day of rehearsals for "Jesus Christ Superstar" in Sydney, Australia. They instantly clicked and became good friends, due to their common love for The Beatles and singing.

Right after the show's performances at 10.30, they would play at pizza parlours, coffee bars and night clubs with just one guitar and two voices. Although they gained quite a reputation for their divine harmonies and original songs that Russell was constantly writing, every single record company in Sydney turned down their demo cassette. All but one, of course, and that was CBS Records.

One afternoon had them making a single, and it immediately shot to number one on the national charts. They opened for Rod Stewart the same year in Australia, and throughout US and Canada. Although they had plenty of fans, they did not break the US market.

They started over in Australia, where they made a record called Life Support. This record was a real treasure, and it included "Lost in Love" which went to Top 10 in Australia and somehow found its way to music industry executive Clive Davis in New York.

Davis immediately signed Air Supply to Arista Records and in 1980, "Lost in Love" became the fastest selling single in the world, leaping to the top of all the charts. Now Air Supply was on their way. The second single was "All Out of Love," and that went up the charts even quicker.

Seven top-five singles later, Air Supply at that time had equalled The Beatles' run of consecutive top five singles. The albums Lost in Love, The One That You Love, Now & Forever, and The Greatest Hits sold in excess of 20 million copies. "Lost in Love" was named Song of the Year in 1980, and, with the other singles, sold more than 10 million copies.

"Lost in Love", "All Out of Love", "The One That You Love", "Sweet Dreams", and "Making Love Out Of Nothing At All" have each achieved multi-million plays on the radio.

I'VE STOPPED SMOKING, I VAPE NOW

Vape: An electronic cigarette (e-cig or e-cigarette) is a battery-operated smoking apparatus, sometimes called a vaporizer, designed to be an alternative to traditional cigarettes.

These days you walk down the street and there's smoke everywhere but it doesn't quite smell like tobacco. The smoke's got some flavour, and it seems that almost everyone has it. Nicotine sticks in a box are a rare sight these days, replaced with an electronic one constantly in people's tight fists. While people do say that vaping is safer than smoking, some are quite undecided about accepting that stand. This month, in conjunction with Lung Cancer Awareness Month, we look at the pros and cons of vaping.

The good

- E- cigarettes produce far fewer carcinogens than traditional cigarettes. Traditional cigarettes contain between 4,000 and 7,000 harmful chemicals, many of which are produced by the tobacco and smoke. Since e-cigarettes use vapour technology, they expose users to fewer carcinogens.
- Some studies show e-cigarettes can be effective in smoking cessation. In multiple studies and surveys, e-cigarettes have been shown to potentially help smokers to reduce their habit or to quit altogether. One New Zealand study showed e-cigarettes to be as effective as nicotine patches.
- The second-hand effects are far less harmful than that of traditional cigarettes. Though second-hand vapour exists, the levels of smoke and second-hand effects of "vaping" are magnitudes lower than traditional smoking.

They are more socially acceptable and do not smell. E-cigarettes provide the same experience and sensation for smokers – particularly those with nicotine habits – but can be used in far more places. They do not leave a sticky, unpleasant odour and do not stain teeth or fingernails.

• They are a cheaper alternative to smoking. While this has not been extensively researched, studies in the UK and the US show that the vaping habit can be up to 40 percent less expensive than cigarette smoking.

The bad

- Nicotine is still an addictive drug. While not all e-cigarettes contain nicotine, most do. Nicotine impacts the neurotransmitters in the brain, causing addictive cravings and behaviour.
- Electronic cigarettes still emit carcinogens. E-cigarettes use liquid nicotine, a highly dangerous substance even in small doses (far more dangerous than tobacco leaves). Some testing suggests that some vaporizers release toxic metals during use.
- The industry is relatively unregulated. These products are not subject to FDA approval and, according to some experts, they have not been studied thoroughly enough to understand potential risks.
- There are potentially dangerous advertisements to young people. Studies have shown that e-cigarette ads reach more than 50 percent of 12 to 17-year-olds, and they are promoting the addictive habit to young people.
- The act of smoking is habit-forming. Almost all experts agree that the physical activities associated with smoking are habit-forming, without the help of tobacco or nicotine. This makes arguments about e-cigarettes helping smokers quit seem flawed, and also could promote a negative habit among previous non-smokers.





ALZHEIMER'S AWARENESS MONTH

Giving "The Long Goodbye" further understanding

ith over 18 million people worldwide were living with Alzheimer's disease in 2014, and the number is expected to triple or even quadruple by 2050. Thus, it's more important than ever to be informed on the science, prevention and treatment of dementia, and promote greater understanding of the disease and its symptoms so that it can be detected and treated early.

Alzheimer's Awareness Month, which occurs every November, was established to honour the millions of people globally living with Alzheimer's, through awareness, education and advocacy for a cure.

The aim of World Alzheimer's Month is to help establish and strengthen awareness of Alzheimer's and all other causes of dementia.

Alzheimer's disease is the most common form of dementia. It is not a part of normal ageing, but a disease involving the progressive loss of brain nerve cells. Since these nerve cells are essential for normal thought, memory and other brain functions, people with Alzheimer's Disease suffer a decline of mental functions which eventually interferes with the patient's normal daily activities.

Over time, Alzheimer's disease patients lose their ability to perform even the most basic activities of daily living like brushing teeth, putting on clothes, bathing and more. In the end, the ability to walk and talk may be lost as well.

Known as the disease of "The Long Goodbye", the illness often stretches over 10 and even 20 years. Despite intensive research in recent years, the disease is still not yet fully understood, and there is still no known cure.

World Alzheimer's Month also provides an opportunity for Alzheimer associations around the world to gain acknowledgement and authority for the work they do, placing themselves in a stronger position to influence people, leaders and governments.

There are many symptoms that may demonstrate the early stages of dementia. The most common early signs of dementia are when an individual forgets recently learned information, having problem with words, disorientation of time and place as well as difficulty in performing familiar tasks.

A thorough evaluation should be obtained when a person first complains of memory loss, confusion or a decline in ability to perform everyday tasks. Early diagnosis is important because it allows early treatment of reversible dementia and can help to alleviate unnecessary suffering for the affected and family members.


Early planning, started when the symptoms of dementia are mild, also can be more effective and may even help limit the financial and psychological burden on the patient and caregivers by preparing them to deal with the disease.

Family members or the person with dementia may resist the clinical evaluation for a variety of reasons. It may be viewed as too demanding for the impaired person or too confusing for the family - there may be fear of knowing the worst, or there may be a belief that the diagnosis is useless because dementia has no cure. Family members will need to help ensure that a thorough evaluation is undertaken when symptoms become apparent. Knowing what to expect along with understanding the benefits of undergoing an evaluation may help to overcome these problems.

Each year, more and more countries are participating in World Alzheimer's Month events and in many areas, dementia awareness is growing.

This year, show your support for Alzheimer's Awareness Month by engaging family and friends in conversations about dementia and Alzheimer, being understanding to those suffering from Alzheimer's around you and being aware of what you can do to help alleviate the stress and suffering of those with Alzheimer's. Alternatively, you can always sport a purple ribbon throughout the month to show your support for the great cause.

Remember, Alzheimer's is not a part of ageing. However, it is a very a special disease that always has room for further understanding from the general public.

The group started off with only 80 men from Adelaide and soon it became a worldwide phenomenon with countries like the



What do you look forward to, in terms of career and personal life?



rolly sticks out like a sore thumb against the quiet backdrop of Menara Felda, Platinum Park in Persiaran KLCC. There are lots of greys around this grea, grey buldings, grey tiling and the day we visited this place was also a grey one due to the rain but nothing could have stopped us from spotting the bright red bus positioned at the corner of the building with a bright signage. This joint is bursting with colours and flavours (as there are nine concepts and kitchens gathered in one charmingly haphazard space). Here you'll see American, Japanese and Shanghainese influences. The décor is inventive as you'll see makeshift sinks made out of tyres, petrol pumps as taps, and sideview mirrors, spanners, tools and rims that protrude from walls. It is absolute insanity, but we love it.

Since we mentioned that there are nine kitchens in Brolly, we got to try nine dishes as well (excluding dessert):

Short Ribs Soup & Mushroom Soup

Who doesn't love a good, warm bowl of mushroom soup every now and then? It had the perfect mix of creamy and sweet. Not too blocky, not too mushroom-y and the texture was just nice. Also, the Short Ribs Soup is the Australian take on our very own sup tulang, and you'll find that you will love this fresh version.

Onion Flower

This is a highly decorative dish and we hated to break it down and start picking at the fried bits before dipping them in sauce. This dish is a complete paradox, because as far as the intricacy of the design goes, you could hardly believe that it's just plain fried onion.

Tiger prawns, quails eggs and seafood tofu skewers

For these grilled selections on skewers, you can get to choose up to three. The seafood tofu is undeniably lovely – smooth with a hint of herbs and spices we suspect are from the Szechuan influences.

Grilled watermelon and pineapple salad

Don't worry, there are some delicacies here that ought to pass your diet regime, like this one, for example. The freshest of fresh vegetables are placed in a bowl and accompanied by grilled watermelon and pineapple slices that entice the palate and satisfy the stomach. No guilt needed.

Spring Chicken

Now, if you're looking for something smoky, peppery and chargrilled as part of your protein requirements then this is the one. A wonderfully marinated whole spring chicken comes with mashed potato and a pool of sauce and garden salad to fill that hungry stomach. Naturally, it is a dish meant to be shared but we wouldn't blame you if you finish it whole.

Beef sirloin single

We like our steaks rare and apparently Brolly does, too. Juices flood the mouth as you chew down on that blissful steak. We could not find a fault in this dish.

Smoked salmon pizza

The difference in texture is enough to keep the tongue at attention – from the soft, velvety slices of salmon against the thin, crusty, crumbly layer that held it together, this one is definitely a hit for us.

Tori Garlic Mayo with signature rice

If you're craving for some Oriental flavours, fret not. Pieces of chicken are served swimming in a pool of creamy sauce, and the signature rice is wrapped neatly around golden omelette and supplemented by yuzutinged cabbage. This one is definitely a must-try.

Grilled Montel Banana Parcel

Ripe bananas grilled and wrapped in aluminium foil, as it soaks the sweet syrupy sauce and melts the cool cream that tops it. There is no way that you cannot wipe this dessert clean.

Chunky Peanut Butter Granola



Upon entering Cedar on 15, patrons would instantly feel the fresh and chic contemporary vibe that exudes from the restaurant and bar. Being one of the few rooftop restaurants in Kuala Lumpur, the modern and elegant outlet with a panoramic view of the city's skyline promises an unforgettable and exclusive dining experience. This eclectically designed restaurant also has a spacious show kitchen, a private dining room, a U-shaped bar and a spacious dining area to cater to the needs of diners.

We were invited to sample the restaurant's menu that features an enthusing concept of pairing dishes with premium oils and vinegars from Vom Fass. For starters, we were served an assorted array of bread that consisted of focaccia, charcoal and logan rolls to nibble on before our meal. The bread rolls came with a serving of walnut oil and olive oil with balsamic pomegranate vinaigrette to dip with.

The Cedar Salad, featuring a plate of baby spinach with shaved Parmesan and toasted pine nuts tossed with mustard walnut vinaigrette was a great way to start our meal. Served with a vial of premium pomegranate balsamic vinegar from Vom Fass said to give the dish a natural twist, the salad was refreshing and decadent with Parmesan and the flavour of the dish was instantly enhanced by a few drops of the tangy vinegar.









The Cream of Topin Ambour (Jerusalem artichoke soup) is a signature dish here at Cedar on 15. Rich and creamy, the soup was soothing and went well with the light and chewy bocconcini cheese and truffle oil. Just a few tiny drops of the truffle oil were enough to heighten the aroma of the artichoke and cheese with an earthy and mushroom-like twist.

For our main course, we ordered the Pumpkin Seed Crusted Black Cod and the Marble 7 Wagyu Beef on Himalayan Rock Salt. The Wagyu beef was cooked in the purest and natural form, which was on the slab of pink Himalayan Rock Salt to ensure freshness. It is recommended that the Wagyu beef be placed on the rock salt for five minutes maximum as the meat will absorb the salt if left longer on the slab. Served with cherry tomatoes and a side of black peppercorn gravy, we loved how buttery the meat was when we pierced through it with a fork. The flavour of the meat was delightful even without pairing it with the gravy – this connoted the freshness and quality of the Wagyu beef.

The Pumpkin Seed Crusted Black Cod was well prepared too. The cod was cooked just right – the centre was firm and juicy and retained the flavour of the fish. The cod was pan-fried and served with mushroom tomato chutney, fennel mousse and sugar pea snaps. To enhance the natural flavours of the cod and vegetables, a few drop of nutty organic hazelnut oil is highly recommended.

For dessert, we were served the decadent Chocolate Molten Cake with fresh raspberry and homemade marzipan ice cream. This was an absolute treat for chocolate lovers on the table round. The strawberry lime liqueur that came with for the finishing touch gave the rich chocolate and creamy taste a refreshingly zesty tang.

All in all, we absolutely enjoyed our visit to Cedar on 15. Considering the food, quality and portions, Cedar on 15 is definitely the place to get the best bang for your buck in an exclusive setting. If you're planning to impress someone with a spectacular meal with a spectacular view of the Kuala Lumpur skyline, it's time you pay Cedar on 15 a visit.

GEE & GEEK

ow this is truly a retreat tucked away in a quiet alley near SS2's Taman Bahagia LRT station.
Driving down the pathway down the SS2 Yong Tau Foo would be simply an ordinary feat, that is until you see a dainty, sparkling café located on your right. Gee & Geek seems out of place around this area, and that is part of the charm. If you're looking for a place to just unwind while not being at a relatively busy area, then this is the place.

Drinks here are named after superheroes. And Gee & Geek can make a mean brownie, and I do still think of it until this day.

Gee & Geek was established by a group of childhood friends who studied at SMK Taman SEA and how fitting that they decided their new restaurant would be located just nearby. After having pursued their studies, they took the plunge to follow their passion.

The cafe's atmosphere is clean and contemporary, with upbeat music playing in the background, simple brick walls and minimal yet effective décor.

I got to sample a couple of their lovely dishes, and one such dish was the Creamy Bacon Pasta, which I was told had sold more than 5, 000 plates in a mere eightmonth period since their grand launch earlier this year. Tossed with homemade creamy white sauce, homemade smoked bacon, grated parmesan cheese and topped with a poached egg, the pasta is effervescent, addictive and highly memorable. With just the right amount of taste, the dish is miles away from most pasta dishes offered at other cafes by not being sickeningly sweet or overly creamy. It rubs the tummy just right way.

Next up was Geek's Signature Pork Burger – handmade juicy pork patty accompanied with sunny side up and homemade cheese sauce. I was pleasantly surprised when I was told that the dish had no added nonsense, no preservatives, no Ajinomoto – as the patty was chockfull of enchanting flavour and aroma. Here at Gee & Geek, they understand that the new generation prefer healthy food, so despite how sinful this dish looks, it truly is the healthier choice.

You also might have noticed that I have mentioned the word 'homemade' quite a couple of times, a recurring theme here at this joint as they pride themselves in having everything done on their own. The bun, the pulling, marinating and smoking of the pork (bacon is normally bound for 72 hours) are all house-made.

They take a whimsical turn with the next dish, the Geek's Pork Bun, which is an Asian fare of fried mantou buns with pork belly and tangy som tam (Thai young mango and papaya salad). Bite into the fluffy buns to experience the soft juiciness of the pork wedged in between and wash it down with the sweet and sour Thai salad, and you'll find yourself in mantou heaven. A delicious combo, indeed.

The brownies here are capable of causing a war between family and friends. A war because you'd want to have it all to yourself, as was my case. Topped with vanilla ice cream, which drips seductively down the edges of the brownie, you'll be bursting with endorphins within seconds.

Most customers here are returning ones, and it's one thing that the people here at Gee & Geek value a lot. They've got loyalty cards to appreciate people who return, most of which are families. There is no heavy traffic around this area, but people do keep coming.

Nevertheless, I could totally understand why they keep returning like bees to honey. If you could spare the chance and time to pop by Gee & Geek, you'll find yourself returning in no time.

My message to Gee & Geek is: keep on doing what you do, because whatever it is, it is working.

P/S Expect me to return every few weeks, or days.

ocated on the lakefront of the Kelana Jaya Lake in Plaza Kelana Jaya is B.G.T. Lakeview Restaurant & Bar. This establishment which opened its doors to the general public about a year ago, serves stupendous meals at affordable prices with a stunning view.

B.G.T., which stands for "Born for Great Taste" have been offering sumptuous Italian and fusion dishes with an offbeat culinary style. Tucked away in the sleepy part of bustling Kelana Jaya, this restaurant has a very alfresco dining feel, as it is mostly open air. The setting of the restaurant is perfect

for couples looking to have a romantic dinner with an amazing view during suppet

Upon our arrival at B.G.T. Lakeview Restaurant & Bar, professionally trained servers who directed us to our table warmly greeted us.

The kind folks of B.G.T. Lakeview Restaurant & Bar told us that an allyou-can-eat pasta deal is available here at the restaurant for those seeking a great value-for-money pasta on a budget. However, during our visit to the restaurant, the chef had prepared a special meal for us.

For starters, we were given a serving of toasted bread with olive oil and balsamic vinegar for dipping. As with most Italian restaurants, the breadbasket is an important part of the meal as patrons will be able to nibble on them before they start rolling out the hot dishes. B.G.T. took a turn from the usual focaccia bread for dipping and used raisin bread that actually paired well with the zesty tang of the balsamic vinegar.



The Gamberetto Con Lemone came next. As an appetizer, we love how this dish was a combination of hot and cool flavours of sautéed de-shelled prawns and cold salad. The lemon and garlic also added a refreshing tang to the otherwise simple dish.

Amori Di Mare is a slow-broiled spicy garlic and tomato soup with a treasure trove of seafood in it. We absolutely loved how the flavours of the soup and bounty of fresh prawns, mussels, calamari and clams worked well together. The soup came served with two pieces of fresh house-made garlic bread that was perfect for soaking up the flavoursome liquid.

The Paella Italiano is a notable favourite here at B.G.T. Lakeview Restaurant & Bar. Unlike the risotto, this dish is an Italian take on the Spanish Paella. The dish featured an amazing potpourri of fresh seafood, namely tiger prawns, squid, clams and slices of chicken breast for the added protein kick. The Paella Italiano was packed with Italian flavours such as peppers and a green pea olio flavour.

The piece de resistance has got to be the wood oven pizza. With the dough and pizza sauce freshly made everyday at the outlet and the pizza being sent straight into the wood oven, patrons are in for a treat of smoky, delightful pizza. We were served the Tex-Mex pizza – a medley of Beef Bolognese, onion, green peppers, black olives, in a special smoky tomato sauce and topped with decadent Mozzarella cheese

With a wide array of dishes served at B.G.T. Lakeview Restaurant & Bar, the restaurant is rapidly becoming the go-to place for budget eating among office workers and residents in the area. COLOURED RICE

Being in Malaysia, one would notice the abundance of coloured rice dishes in town. These rice dishes such as Nasi Kerabu, Nasi Dagang and more have always been part and parcel of the local food scene, be it for breakfast, lunch or dinner. If you're intrigued and would like to try some of these dishes, here's where you can get the top 5 rice dishes in town:

NASI DAGANG

Literally translated as "trader's rice", Nasi Dagang is a popular East Coast dish, often eaten for breakfast. The mixture of glutinous rice and rice is steamed with coconut milk, chopped shallots, ginger shreds, lemongrass and fenugreek seeds and usually has a slightly reddish tint. Traditionally, nasi dagang is eaten with gulai ikan tongkol, a flavourful curry enriched with coconut milk and sweetened with palm sugar. Our favourite place to get our Nasi Dagang fix is an unassuming food stall called Warung Kak Zai. Just off the DUKE highway, this small shack located across Restoran Ameen Bistro is well worth the drive for their delicious Terengganu-style nasi dagang. The rice here is done just right, not too oily or too moist, and the tuna fish is cooked to a slightly softer texture in an incredibly appetising gravy.

NASI KFRABU

The Nasi Kerabu has a distinctive blue colour from being cooked with butterfly pea flower or bunga telang. In Kelantan, they also serve a yellow rice version where turmeric is used to colour the rice. The Nasi Kerabu is served with a riot of different thinly sliced herbs and vegetables and a side meat dish of choice. You also have salted egg, toasted grated coconut, fish floss, fish crackers and a dash of fermented fish sauce or budu, an essential Kelantan condiment that elevates the taste of this dish. Get this dish at Warong Kelate Masakan Pantai Timur in Klang for a mean serving of Nasi Kerabu. Look for this shack that serves delicious Kelantan food in the morning by spotting the long queue of patrons.

PULUT KUNING

Pulut kuning is a simple dish made of sticky rice, fresh turmeric and coconut milk. However simple it may seem, the technique used to create this dish is a little complex and only a few places manage to get it right. Kak Ana sells an authentic fare of Pulut Kuning in Taman Tun Dr. Ismail. Steamed to perfection, the bright yellow glutinous rice is wrapped in fragrant banana leaf. Customer's queue up since the break of dawn to get a taste of the Pulut Kuning here. Though the pulut is nice to have on its own, customers can opt to have it with rendang or even fried chicken.

KHAW NEAW MAMUANG

In most Thai dishes, the mango sticky rice is usually served as a plate of plain white sticky rice with caramelised coconut milk and cubed mangoes. Here at My Elephant, the glutinous rice is of black and white rice, yielding a two-tone splendour. After a hot and warmly comforting Thai meal, this mango with sticky rice dish is a perfect way to seal things sweetly.

Biryani rice is a strong contender in being the local favourite in contrast to the classic nasi lemak. 

Now into his second year as Managing Director of Malaysia Airports Holdings Berhad, Datuk Badlisham Ghazali is fast gaining recognition in the global aviation world. A speaker at the World Routes Strategy Summit in Chicago in 2014 and the 22nd Global Airport Development conference this year, he is also Special Advisor to Airports Council International Asia-Pacific. He sits on the Boards of the international airports at Delhi, Hyderabad, Istanbul and Male.

This month, Datuk Badlisham shares some thoughts about the World Routes Strategy Summit and the World Routes Development Forum.



AIRPORT MD SPEAKS

"In September, the World Routes Development Forum 2015 took place in Durban, South Africa. Taking place alongside this event, the World Routes Strategy Summit brought together over 50 senior leaders from across the route development and aviation industries to participate in thought-provoking discussions that will set the commercial and political agenda for the aviation industry in the coming years. I was represented at both

events by Malaysia Airports Advisor Tan Sri Bashir Ahmad and Senior General Manager Planning Muhamad Khair Mirza.

"The World Routes Strategy Summit brought industry thought-leaders under one roof to participate in a number of discussions covering topics affecting the industry today, such as air-service development, infrastructure, airline challenges and growth concerns, new

technologies and best practices. Tan Sri Bashir participated in Panel Session 3, which was about The Changing Business of Airports. The discussions covered topics such as How are airline relationships changing? Do airline-incentives help the air-service development process? What do airlines need to come to your airport? How do groups of airport compete differently? What is the one issue governments need to get educated about?

"I am proud to note that Malaysia Airports has been a pioneering entity in this industry event, hosting the first World Routes Strategy Summit in its present form, at the World Routes 2008 in Kuala Lumpur. We also hosted the first regional Routes events in history! This was our pioneering venture hosting Routes Asia in 2003, 2004 and 2005. We made Malaysia proud when we became the first venue in Asia to host a World Routes event in 2008, and we were also the first Routes Asia hosts in Borneo, last year in Kuching.

"We also pioneered both cultural dances and the serving of food at the booth, things that have now been emulated by airports from all over the world. The delicious satay we serve has become part of the unique Malaysian branding at this global event. The heart of our involvement at this event, however, is our main objective - to facilitate the number of airlines and flights operating from the airports we operate across Malaysia and other parts of the world. All activities we conduct at this event - the scheduled table-meetings, the booth-appointments, the attendance at networking functions, the participation at the Strategy Summit - all these are part and parcel of our commitment to building connectivity at our airports in tandem with our airline-partners. This will remain our primary focus in the months and years to come."













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"Meeting in Africa, reaching the World"

Malaysia Airports reached airlines at World Routes 2015 in Durban.



"Africa is not one country, it is 54 different countries. Africa is the fastestgrowing continent in terms of population. Six African countries are among the top ten fastest growing economies of the world." These words by the President of Ghana, John Dramani Mahama, in August this year, seemed to resonate among the delegates of The World Route Development Forum who had gathered in Durban, South Africa in September.

Once every year, the entire world commercial-aviation community gathers together at an event called World Routes. This year, 2015, marked the historic first

time that the largest annual international event in commercial aviation was held on the Great Continent of Africa, and it was an eye-opener for all attendees, including the large team from Malaysia Airports, led by Advisor Tan Sri Bashir Ahmad and Senior General Manager Planning Khair Mirza.

Although Khair Mirza is familiar to airline events such as Routes Asia and BAR gatherings, this was the first time he was at a World Routes event. "Although I have spent nearly four years with Malaysia Airports, now was finally the right time to set in motion a wider discourse with our most likely airline partners into the next decade. It was also


















timely in that we had just set forth the specific principles underpinning our airline partner strategies up to 2020 with one eye on the immense connectivity of over a thousand destinations that the oneworld airline alliance brings to Malaysia, compared to the less than 100 that singular airline groups can boast of."

"Developed specifically to encourage airports and airlines to meet directly to discuss new routes, services and products, as well as global growth-potential and challenges facing the global aviation industry, World Routes saw leaders from airport groups, regional airports, airlines, aviation- industry suppliers, consultants and tourism boards gather to participate in meetings, attend networking events, speak to global aviation experts at the Strategy Summit and explore the potential of the host as an airport hub and destination.

"I had three main objectives at World Routes. There was an opportunity to put a face to the other airlines, especially of the oneworld alliance, that last year connected millions of passengers to Kuala Lumpur from over a thousand destinations. And plant the flag on the future extent of collaboration that Malaysia Airports aspires to have with such far-reaching partnerships. Next, we put our Istanbul Sabiha Gokcen International Airport in front of familiar airlines to Malaysia Airports, to build further on the already over 90 international destinations at the airport.

Thirdly, it was vital to deepen our understanding of our other airports, to test and stretch new ideas and re-visit existing paradigms, collaboratively. We also shared notes on what the most common

requests by airlines were, as we endeavoured to keep abreast of the fast-paced demands levied by passengers and as reflected in airline requests."

What struck him most, however, was the joint-teams' efforts. "Rome wasn't built in a day, but I must admit a new-found respect for my colleagues and partners in the way hardened veterans were taking on new ways and new ideas and flexing them to both new and old airline faces."


Working with industry partners like Tourism Malaysia and KL Airports Services, the Malaysia Airports team scheduled table-meetings, held booth-appointments, attended networking functions and even hosted a much sought-after satay-lunch for the Routes fraternity as part of its marketing and development strategy.

Also present were Commercial Aviation Head Aytun Demirel and Key Account Manager Sevin Ibrikci, colleagues from Istanbul Sabiha Gokcen airport; one of the international airports managed by Malaysia Airports Holdings Berhad. Istanbul's premier airport at the crossroads of Europe and Asia was also boldly highlighted at the booth.

Khair Mirza feels such cross-selling and market integration is vital in this era of globalization and globally-connected flows. Istanbul is critical because it offers airlines the magical ten-hour flight duration between Kuala Lumpur and Istanbul – the gateway to both Europe and Africa. Most encouragingly, Istanbul has provided growth in the range of 12-20% each month since January this year.





An abstract on **DREW HARRIS**

Style

Paintings by Drew Harris are abstract expressions in style. They are deeply moving and are almost a spiritual experience. Although his paintings portray tranquility, they are very potent. He, however, does not believe that an artist's role is to deliver a message.

"Each of us have our own lives. It is not for me to tell you how to conduct your life. I am just showing a bit of my feelings through the

paintings. If the viewer likes the painting, he will sense my feelings." -

Career

Toronto-born abstract artist Harris, 53, has been living in Kuala Lumpur and Penang for the past two decades and has been exhibiting periodically over the years. The Malaysian-based Canadian studied graphic design and fine arts for six years at college and started his

career as a graphic designer in Toronto. In the mid-1980s, he realised that he was making more money from his paintings than graphic designs and decided to take the plunge to become a full-time artist.

Harris received his formal education in design and fine arts at Georgian College of Applied Arts in Ontario, Canada (1979-1982), receiving the Ontario Premiere's Award for most outstanding student of design in Ontario. He began his professional career in Toronto, Canada as senior design director for Communique Ltd, Canada's leading corporate communications company specialising in motivational seminars and talks, and corporate identity designs and corporate video presentations.

In 1991, after six years with Communique, Harris began his career as a full-time visual artist exhibiting his abstract paintings nationally and throughout the world and in such cities as Toronto, Chicago, New York, Vancouver, Melbourne, Jakarta, Singapore and Kuala Lumpur.

On his work

"My training was in graphic design, primarily type design, so my view of type or text whether it be in an entire page of copy, or simply a single character, I tend to see the "flow", or perhaps, the negative or positive space around a mark in typography. The suggestion of text or character is interesting to me, especially in an overall composition," he said. Over the years, his colour palette has been kept simple, or rather similar, being in tones of ochre, black, red and warm white.

"I have extended beyond my 'colour comfort level' and have been introducing warmer shades of red, orange, light blue and yellow, which I see as fresh, and I might add, reflect where I am as an artist in this stage of my career and life.

"One may say, my colours reflect a certain degree of quiet confidence, less stark, less aggressive use of hard elements," he said.

When he paints, his main concern is to have complete connection to the work. As for any profound message, Harris doesn't think he intentionally starts out with any high-minded artist statement but rather, it is a feeling that develops.

"My work has for a number of years, related to elements seen in weather. I joke, but coming from Canada, our seasons are made up of four distinct elements. These extremes are hard to ignore in the psyche of a Canadian," he said.

Collectors and Current Projects

Harris, who has exhibited widely, has his artworks in many private and corporate collections in Europe and Asia. His works have been showcased and sold in various international galleries around the world. They can be found in Chicago, New York, Malaysia, Indonesia, Australia and Toronto.

His works are collected by The Bank of Switzerland, Faulding Pharmaceuticals – Singapore, Hong Kong and Shanghai Investment Bank, Sun Life Insurance – Toronto, The Four Seasons Hotel – Las Vegas, The International Film Festival – Toronto, The Embassy of France – Indonesia, Variety Magazine-Sydney. Harris currently resides and maintains a working studio in Kuala Lumpur with his wife, artist and educator Sharifah Mazwari.

Harris's interests include music, documentary filmmaking, writing and supporting a new generation of visual artists through mentoring programmes he and Mazwari have developed. He continues to build exhibitions which exhibit regularly in various cities in Asia and North America.



One of highlights of the exhibition is a spectacular large-scale mural on canvas, The





work painted especially for the Retrospective exhibition showcasing ladies in Cheongsam and Penang landmarks. Syed Thajudeen believes in preserving our culture and heritage through his paintings, his legacy for future generations.

The artist is a connoisseur of love, having painted his protagonists in various stages of love. He has depicted the first instance of love through his Meeting of the Eyes, the yearning of lovers with his Longing for Love and Waiting for the Lover series and the culmination of the yearning with the Joy of Being Together.

Through his paintings, Syed Thajudeen has depicted the love that transcends that of lovers, with his Mother and Child series, the Merdeka Series and the Spiritual series. At each stage of a man's life he would experience love, at

birth a mother's love, as a young adult a lover's touch, as a mature man a strong sense of duty and love towards his nation, and finally as an older wise man's deeper love towards his Creator. His paintings capture the very essence of being human and with his Origin series he explores the moment of creation.

Syed Thajudeen is an artist extraordinaire, a master of his trade, who dedicated much of his life to his work, with brilliant pieces, which he painstakingly created to bring joy and happiness to those around him.

ARTIST BIC

Syed Thajudeen (b. 1943) has been painting for the past 50 years and is recognised as one of the stalwarts of the Malaysian art scene. He has honed his mastery of the figurative figure, being able to create miniature pieces to mural-sized masterpieces. Although Syed Thajudeen's stylisation is influenced by the Bauhaus art of Paul Klee and his Indian education background, themes of his work are mostly based on the Malay culture, which can be seen in his Kebaya series. Syed Thajudeen has exhibited extensively around the world, including the USA, Belgium, UK, UAE and China with nine solo exhibitions under his belt to date. Syed Thajudeen's paintings are a permanent collection of the National Art Gallery of Malaysia, Singapore Art Museum, Beijing Olympic Museum, corporate buildings and many private homes in Malaysia and abroad. He had taught Fine Arts at the MARA Institute of Technology, Malaysia and been a resident artist at the United Asian Bank. He currently serves as a board member of the National Visual Arts Development Board, Malaysia.

LOVE & HARMONY

Solo Exhibition of Paintings and Photography by June Yap Yu-dan

ast October, multi-talented artist June Yap Yu-dan presented Love and Harmony, her sixth solo exhibition celebrating the native African women, an exciting amalgamation of paintings and photography and a culmination of her extensive travels in the continent. The exhibition opened on 19 October at White Box, Publika before the viewing from 20 to 21 October. The exhibition then travelled to SGM Selangor Culture Centre, Klang from 31 October until 8 November.

Placing the native African female under the limelight, this exhibition focuses on the core values of love and peace by challenging and displacing our perception of inner beauty. The word 'love' has been deconstructed and reviewed under June's unconventional interpretations in her paintings, which carry a strong humanitarian outlook.

When asked why the rare choice of subject matter, June answered: "I saw the strong maternal bond in these native African communities. By using the native African female as the main subject, I want to celebrate the very essence of familial love and how it can ultimately bring world peace."

To say that June is a fervent traveller would not be an understatement. She has ventured across five continents, more than 70 countries and over 95,000 kilometres on her four-wheel drive in the last decade. Having visited various places within the continent of Africa, It was her sixth and most recent visit to Ethiopia last year. During this time, June found that the African women with thick lips, large foreheads, broad hips, braided hair and dark skin, possessed the simplest forms of beauty.

Displayed alongside the oil paintings are photographs taken by June during her trips, evidently showcasing various African tribes within their peculiar environments and cultures. June specifically highlighted the Surma women of Ethiopia wearing lip plates, where the biggest lip plate indicates the highest bride price paid

which includes 40 cattles and a Russian AK47 rifle. Another powerful image depicts the back of a Hamer woman covered in thick scars as a result of their coming-of-age rituals where the scars are proud symbols of their courage.

A self taught artist, June is first and foremost a creator. She has an innate passion for anything creative, which leads her to explore multi-disciplinary approaches to art. Unrestricted by formal art education conformities, June paints with her instinct. The use of green for the subjects' skin tone, its juxtaposition on minimal planes of spacial colours, and the deliberate omission of the eyes, are all part of her daring and spontaneous choices on the canvases.

From a wider point of view, an obvious underlying theme of maternal love punctuates Love and Harmony. The responsibilities and sacrifices of a mother are cleverly conveyed in the nuances in the body language and postures of the mother and her children, for instance the simple acts of carrying and breast-feeding. A mother of two, June believes the maternal bond transcends nationality, race or skin colour. It is an intrinsic relationship that builds on love and requires no return, and perhaps forms the basis of her own notion towards love and harmony.


A travel photographer, a Chinese ink painter and an award winning expert in Artistic Floral Arrangement, June is also a successful business woman. June held her very first solo photography exhibition in 2008, her first solo floral arrangement show the following year, and has participated in over 80 group exhibitions locally and over 50 group exhibitions abroad.

Ten una buena estancia en Malasia, MIGUEL HUELAMO!

Miguel Huelamo Estrada is the executive chef of Aka Cochin, Pavilion. He graduated from the renowned Escuela Irizar Culinary School and has been in the line with Michelin-starred chefs and was the executive sous chef in Zuma Hong Kong, Miami and London. He opened Obelix London and was the group executive chef of multiple restaurants in Athens. With lots of experience and leaving his culinary mark around the world, the chef is currently stationed in Malaysia, where we managed to snatch a bit of his time for a chat.

Where are you originally from and what was your hometown like?

I was born and raised in Madrid, the capital of Spain. Madrid is a beautiful city with very nice food – Spanish food, of course. We don't have much Asian food over there, and the Chinese and Japanese food are normally adapted to suit the Western palate. My family loves to eat, so I have always been cooking with them.

When did you arrive in Malaysia and what was your first impression?

I arrived last year, around the end of May or the beginning of June. I came here for a visit, to see the restaurants and owners. My first impression was ... the heat, the humidity. Back then I was living in Greece, so the humidity was the main difference. I used to stay in Taipei too and it is also hot and humid, very similar to Malaysia, so I like to go outdoors. But if I had to pinpoint something that makes Malaysia different from most countries I've been in is that everything seems to happen in malls. There is so much life in the shopping malls. Not so much street life, except in places like Jalan Alor. I also like the good mix of race and culture. The people here are outgoing, warm and very friendly. I also like the diversity here, like I can see a woman dressed in full hijab gear walking next to a Chinese lady and they're all just getting along fine with no problems whatsoever. Good impression, definitely.

What about islands in Malaysia, have you been to any of them?

Yes, once for about 3-4 days to Pulau Mersing. I really like diving, so I would like to go to Sabah and Sarawak and check it out.

You move around a lot.

Yes, I've been in Asia for about 12 years. Taiwan, Shanghai, London, Greece and lots of other places before I came here.

What was the transition like moving from country to country? Do you ever get homesick?

Not really, I've been out of Spain for a very long time. I've been busy going to and exploring other places, but I do think home is where you are – happy and with your father, mother, sisters and old friends. However, you can easily make friends in a lot of places and

I like to visit mine in Taiwan, Hong Kong, Shanghai and Malaysia. Plus, I have my own small family. I got married a couple of years ago and my wife and I just had a baby this year. She's our little princess, very pretty. So right now, my family is here. My parents came to visit – they arrived on the same day the baby was born and stayed for three months. My mother is already planning to come here for Christmas again.

How did you get into your current career as a chef?

My family. Everybody loved to eat, and during lunch we'd be discussing dinner and the lunch menu for the next day already. My dad dearly loves to cook and my mother is a very good cook. When I was 18, my mother announced that she was done with cooking and that it would be my turn to cook. I've always been picky about food, ever since I was little. There are certain things I'd prefer to be done in a certain way, my way. We loved to eat out with my parents and their friends. We used to go for tapas and frequent this bar until it closed down. It was so shocking and dramatic for me because nobody knew how to do it the way I liked it. That was when I tried to recreate it. It was the first step. I studied Biology in college, and I really liked to understand the science behind things and how they worked. So I applied those scientific methods to the kitchen. I later realised that I didn't want to work in that field; a 9-to-5 job in a white coat wasn't quite for me. I had a chance to be part of a kitchen preparation, and I found it to be fun. That mix of playfulness was what gripped me.

Some people say cooking is like art, but I don't really agree because art is different in a sense, where you get inspiration and you create a painting, a sculpture or a part of culture. But if you keep doing the same thing over and over again, it's not considered an art anymore. So to me, for cooking, you need to be able to prepare and make a dish and repeat it.

What is your secret to success?

To me, there really isn't a secret to success. It's just hard work and experience. I haven't reached the pinnacle, it's still an ongoing process.

Any challenges?

Working very hard with sharp knives! In this type of job, injuries are common and you've got to work around it. Fix it (wound), glue it, put a bandage around it and keep working. Working 12-hour shifts, 15-hour shifts, 6 or 7 days a week. Now that I have a baby it's quite difficult as I want to be at home more.

How do you feel about Malaysian food? Any favourites?

Actually, I think it's hard to find very authentic Malaysian food. If there are, it's difficult to find. I've tried looking in magazines and such, but they're really hard to find. The ones at the malls are not as authentic as they should be, I think. But the options are very good, though. I like kuay teow, nasi lemak, and tandoori and naan.

Any favourite holiday destinations in Malaysia so far?

My home, my house. I haven't had the chance to travel that much, but there are plans to do so. I like Cameron Highlands though, but I need to find the time to travel more to places such as Mount Kinabalu.

What is your current project and what is your vision for Aka Cochin?

An update on the menu, definitely. To add dishes that would be more popular. We are steadily growing and we have repeat customers. As a restaurant, we are working very well but we are struggling as an Izakaya, a Japanese-style bar. We have new concepts in Putra Mall and there are a couple of ideas more on the sidelines.

What is your advice to those who would love to pursue your career line or take the plunge into the unknown?

You have to enjoy doing it. You have to ask yourself every time you eat – what do you like and how do you like it? You need to start cooking by yourself. I can perfectly tell the difference between garlic that is cooked slowly or fried, and garlic that is freshly chopped or left aside for a long time. You need to know your stuff. You need to create a palate of flavours and essentially like what you do.

TRUE RESPECT FOR NATURE: COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND EDUCATION IN CONSERVATION

Nature and people are intrinsically related. From the basic building blocks of life, such as oxygen-generation, freshwater, source of raw materials and food, to inspiring art, poetry, dance and firing the human imagination; it has always been a delicate dance between us, the benefactors of nature's bounty, and nature the giver, the protector and the muse. The work of conservation is about ensuring the intactness of nature's functions in all their permutations, complexity and variations. More importantly, this work is done to make sure that nature can continue to sustain life – including human life – on Earth.

While the WWF family comprises a tribe of like-minded people who strive towards the stewardship of nature, part of the WWF vision is also to work with local and indigenous communities who live at the threshold of natural environments – forests, seas and rivers – to empower them towards stewardship within their capacity. At the same time, their wellbeing and livelihoods are not forgotten, and so we work towards empowering them for conservation. In WWF-Malaysia, we refer to this work as Community Engagement and Education (CEE). It is embedded within the framework of Education for Sustainable Development, which incorporates the human element in nature conservation. This straddles two parallel lines of work: the formal system, which includes schools and educational institutions, as well as CEE, or the informal system, which includes local and indigenous communities.

In Malaysia, CEE is one of many tools used to support WWF's programmes, including the seas, such as turtle conservation and sustainable fishing to freshwater systems, such as gulam forests as well as the rainforests, such as the conservation of tigers and highland ecosystems. CEE work is fundamental to any conservation project carried out in or near communities whose lives are affected by changes to their surrounding natural environment. CEE plays a crucial role if these communities are to participate in the long-term management of these natural resources, and we ask ourselves two fundamental questions:

- 1) How do communities benefit from the engagement?
- 2) How does conservation benefit from the engagement?

The crux of our success lies in the balance between the answers to both these questions. It is one way of showing genuine respect for Mother Nature and all who live in her domain.

TRIPLE TACKS: TATTOOING, THREADING AND TWEEZING

We've been raising eyebrows at the trends blossoming this year when it comes to taking great lengths to get the perfect brow shape, texture and colour. Women (and men) are swept away by the new notion that big, thick eyebrows are in (as opposed to the thin-penciled brows of the 1990s) and are constantly on the lookout to see what kind of treatments would get their brows to perfectly shape the face. Trends around the world include bleached brows, brightly coloured brows, thick ungroomed brows (in the zest to emulate Cara Delevingne), but here in Malaysia we are not strangers to eyebrow embroidery, threading and plucking. In this section, we dissect the trends, so that you can decide which road to take for your next brow appointment.

THE SEMI-PERMANENT TATTOO

Unlike eyebrow tattoos, it is semi-permanent and can last up to two years. By adding coloured pigment to the skin, this technique fills in empty spots on your brows to give them a full and flawless look.

With a feathering technique, this procedure can produce a natural look since it uses pigments perfectly matched to your actual eyebrow colour. After tracing out the area where the desired brow should be, the entire area is filled in with hair-like pigments. Eyebrow embroidery is also great for thickening existing eyebrows or darkening them and making them more apparent.

How is eyebrow embroidery done?

First, a technician will clean up your brow line by removing strays. Then, an anaesthetic cream will be applied to reduce the sensation of pain. Once the desired brows are traced, the technician will use a small blade to cut very small pieces of the top layer of the skin away and apply the new colour in its place.

There may be some redness and minor swelling, but that should disappear within a few hours to a couple of days.

The colour will likely fade by about 50 to 70 percent in the first two weeks, so a follow-up session will be required. It is important to avoid scrubbing the brow area or picking off any scabs that may form, in order to protect the new eyebrows. Because this treatment is semi-permanent, it will require touch-ups from time to time as long as you choose to have them.

THREADING

Eyebrow threading is an ancient hairremoval technique, practised for centuries among the most beautiful women of Asia and the Middle East.

It is the best alternative to waxing and tweezing, especially for sensitive skin.

Unlike waxing, threading does not remove a layer of skin, which can leave the skin on your face susceptible to sun damage. By far the least invasive method of facial hair

removal, this method creates a graceful brow with clean, well-defined edges that frame the eye.

How does it work?

In threading, a thin (cotton or polyester) thread is doubled, then twisted. It is then rolled over areas of unwanted hair, plucking the hair at the follicle level. Unlike tweezing, where single hairs are pulled out one at a time, threading can remove short lines of hair.

Advantages cited for eyebrow threading, as opposed to eyebrow waxing, are that it provides more precise control in shaping eyebrows and is gentler on the skin. It can be painful as several hairs are removed at once. However, this can be minimised if it is done correctly.

There are a few different techniques for threading. These include the hand method, mouth method and neck. Each technique has advantages and disadvantages; however, the mouth holding method is the fastest and most precise.







Threading allows for a more defined and precise shape and can create better definition for eyebrows. It is also used as a method of removing unwanted hair on the entire face and upper lip area. Threading, however, is not a good method for removing hair on arms or legs, as the hair in these regions is typically quite coarse and there is too much to remove.

PLUCKING

Tweezing is great because it's easy, absolutely DIY and cost-effective. There is no appointment needed and the only thing you'll ever need is a great set of tweezers and a steady hand!

How does it work?

You can pencil your eyebrows in their desired shape and then tweeze around

that, using it as a guideline. Which hairs you tweeze and which ones you don't is the difference between attractively shaped brows and misshapen ones. Try using an eyebrow pencil to draw on different shapes over your brow area to see which shape looks the best. Use a magnifying mirror, at least a 5X magnification, so you can see each hair.

Go slowly (one hair at a time), so you don't over-tweeze. The beginning of the brow should align with the centre of the nostril. The arch of the brow should fall at the back third of the eye. The eyebrow should follow the length of the eye but it shouldn't extend into the temple area. The basic rule is that the front part of the brow should never drop below the back part of the brow. Allowing this to happen, either with the way you tweeze your

eyebrows or the way you draw them on, makes you look like you're frowning and overemphasises the downward movement of the back part of the eye.

Avoid over-tweezing above the brow. A few stray hairs are fine to remove, but too much can create an unnatural look. Do not overstate the shape of the brow; minimal brow alteration is best. Do not pluck brows into a thin line, thinking it will make your eyes look larger. It can look dated or give the face a surprised look and this shape is not easy to correct once the damage is done.

While this seems like the perfect method for those wanting to save cost or for those who are extremely controlling about their faces, one needs to beware of overplucking, dated tweezers, imbalance of lengths or making too much of an arch.

Top Three Trails for Biking

ycling is a new trend these days and why would it not be? It's half the amount of wheels but twice the amount of fun. It is also efficient in both commuting and saving money, it builds muscles and well, you don't need a parking lot for it. Malaysia's tropical climate may deter some from being outdoors too much, but it certainly doesn't stop adrenaline junkies from exploring and utilising the multi-type terrains found in abundance across the country. There are just too many biking trails around, and the routes are endless and ever interconnecting.

If you're a biking enthusiast and are looking for some place to start or mark the spots on your map, check out the top three biking trails in Malaysia, ranked according to their popularity with the local biking community.

1. FRIM Biking Trail

The Forest Research Institute Malaysia (FRIM) is a popular spot that offers a plethora of recreational activities despite being a tropical forest research institution. Located in Kepong, it has been made a highly accessible area for the local community.

While other activities such as birdwatching and camping are popular in FRIM, common cycling activities are also allowed there. There are designated roads solely for cycling as well as trails designed for the purpose of mountain biking activities in FRIM. The authorities at FRIM have since 2014, established trails that cater strictly to biking enthusiasts.

Believed to provide a more natural surrounding and experience to mountain bikers, FRIM is a common place where most biking enthusiasts start out. Wide trails and fresh air aside, the biking trails comprise Bukit Bujang, Simpang K, Perah Campsite, Tongkat Ali or Bukit Steroid and Puncak Pinus or known as Helipad. Each trail comes with its own level of difficulty, categorised as light (10km), medium (20km) or challenging (30km). There are no rules on which trail should you take on but biking enthusiasts are advised to make choices depending on if you're still a novice or a veteran at this.

If FRIM is where you're setting your sights on for your next biking adventure, note that there are rules and regulations to be followed. The tracks are open for activities from 5.30 am until 7.30 pm but visitors can only conduct their activities on designated tracks and be mindful of any changes made by the authorities at FRIM as the tracks may be re-designated from time to time,

depending on changes in seasonal weather and safety precautions. To get pedalling, you'd also need a permit to be displayed at all times and made available for inspection.

It's normal to be lost in the heat of the wilderness when you're pedalling across the rocky terrain, but one must always be alert of not only the nature of the trails, but also the passers-by. Due to its location being a hotspot for the public, FRIM is always a little more packed compared to isolated outdoor areas that are more common for high-impact activities. Open to the general public and tourists, biking in the area is deemed to be relatively very safe as it is monitored and is always alive with outdoor activities and campaigns being held.

2. Pantai Kok, Langkawi


When you speak of Langkawi, it is inevitably about the beautiful beaches, the fresh summer breeze and all things tropical about the little local paradise. While outdoor activities are commonly held around the island, biking isn't a common sport for most.

Despite its flowy and beach vibes, many cycling and biking competitions have been held around Langkawi for many years. Prominent ones include Le Tour De Langkawi and the Langkawi International Mountain Bike Challenge.

Located on the western coastline, Pantai Kok is relatively a quieter place compared to Pantai Cenang. Home of the Oriental Village and Perdana Quay, this area has seen mountain biking become a popular activity. Langkawi's highest peak, Mount Mat Cincang is situated within the area which is covered with rainforest and is home to a diverse range of flora, fauna and great bird life. While Mount Mat Cincang is more widely known its famous cable car attraction, its terrain has been challenged by many through mountain biking activities, making it as no surprise that motorcycling and mountain biking have become greatly popular here.

You can easily get everything you need from the operators in Mount Mat Cincang. Located inside the Oriental Village itself, Cicli offers exciting mountain biking and motorcycling expeditions in the geo park of the mountain. Going on the trails means exploring much more of the rainforest on the mountain slopes while getting plenty of sightings of birds and flora and fauna.

3. Cameron Highlands Jungle Trail

This popular, chilly local favourite is one of Malaysia's extensive hill stations. Known for its breathtaking beauty and untainted air and fruit produce, this attraction is located in on the northwestern tip of the east coast state of Pahang.

Cameron Highlands is more known for its tea plantations, lush jungles laden with exotic flora, waterfalls and clear rivers as well as orchards and luxury resorts but there's always room for some dirt action up north. The massive land area provides for over 14 different trails that will definitely tear your muscles out.

Trail 7 & Trail 8 are marked as the toughest areas amongst all 14 trails. The adventure on Trail 7 begins with a two-hour haul that starts from MARDI with a steep ascent to Gunung Beremban on an overgrown path before you can descend from the top on Trail 3 (a highly recommended route) or hike down Trail 8 for another two to three hours of adrenaline-filled adventure. If that isn't already a Herculean challenge for you, test your endurance on Trail 8 with a difficult three-hour climb that

starts from the Robinson Waterfall to Gunung Beremban. In between the dirt action and the fresh air, each trail truly holds spectacular sights for you to witness. For instance, the Robinson Waterfall is located along Trail 8. If you manage to go all the way up there, there's definitely a little something for you to see.

Fret not, if you're more of a beginner and wish to take it easy (which is extremely easy to do, seeing how serene and light the atmosphere in Cameron Highlands is), the other trails are relatively easy with most marked as moderate for biking enthusiasts to counter. The easiest trail to take on is Trail 4 which starts with a 30-minute stroll to Parit Waterfall. The path is paved in stretches with a turning to the watchtower and starts nearby the Forestry Department. Signage are available all the way throughout the trails, with safety precautions displayed to remind biking enthusiasts of certain necessary measures such as bringing along water supply and hotel contact numbers. You can also take a tour guide along in your action-packed pedal adventure, just in case!

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





Getting around in Kuala Lumpur is easy. The transit systems are efficient, taxis are plenty and buses are cheap. The public transportation usage peak hours are from 7am to 9am and 4.30pm to 6.30pm during the working days.

By Transit systems

The KL monorail and LRT coaches are air-conditioned and comfortable and run from 6am to midnight. The systems are connected to each other at several points and the network covers most parts of the city. Fares range from RM0.70 to RM2.80 per single journey.



Taxis are easily available at hotels or at taxi stands. Fares start at RM3 for the first kilometre and RM0.10 for every 115 metres thereon. There is a 50% surcharge on the metered fare from midnight to 6am and a baggage charge of RM1 per piece stored in the boot. There is also an additional RM1 for 3rd passenger (maximum 4 in a car). For an extra charge of RM2, you can book a taxi by phone.



Ecovans can accommodate up to 5 passengers. They serve mainly guests at major hotels and follow the fare structure of taxis but charge RM4 instead of RM2 for the first kilometre.



Buses serve all parts of Kuala Lumpur with fares beginning from RM1. Some hotels also offer free bus shuttle services to major shopping malls in the city.

KL Hop-on/Hop-off Bus Service

Getting to the Airport

KLIA Ekspres: The journey takes about 30 minutes from KL Sentral and the fare is RM35 per person per way. There is also check-in facility at KL Sentral for some airlines.

Taxi: The fare from the city centre to the airport is RM60 - RM90 per taxi.

Eco Transit: Eco Transit can accommodate up to 5 adults and has a fixed fare of RM130/ trip.


Limousine: Can be arranged with the hotel concierge and fare range from RM100 - RM200.




