





### KHALIL IBRAHIM

In loving memory of this prolific artist, KL Lifestyle looks back at his long-spanning and illustrious career

aestro Khalil Ibrahim,
Malaysia's iconic art legend
returned to his Creator at the
age of 84 on May 15, in
University Malaya Medical
Centre, Petaling Jaya. While we grieve the
passing of this great man, we pay homage
by looking back at his colourful life and long
spanning career as one of Malaysia's greatest
artists. Aptly described by KLAS as Malaysia's
father of figurative painting, Khalil Ibrahim
was born in 1934 in Kubang Krian, Kelantan.
He was one of the earliest Malaysians who
received a full state scholarship in 1960 to

study art at the prestigious Central St Martins School of Art and Design, London.

His masterful skills in drawing, watercolour and acrylic, are styles that move from the almost real to the almost abstract. Until his passing, Khalil was ardent to art, surrounded by familiar canvas or batik on canvas before him and paint brushes for days in his studio in Petaling Jaya. A book on this artist entitled, 'The Art Journey of Khalil Ibrahim' by KL Lifestyle Art Space pays homage to his journey as an artist and the amazing artworks he had created over the span of his career.



### **HOW IT ALL BEGAN**

Khalil's rich Malay cultural background in the East Coast and the discipline of Islamic values that he learnt at the Pondok school shaped his primordial artistic journey. These values stuck by him which then merged with the freedom of expression that he encountered later through his formal art education at St. Martins in London. Though he did not receive any formal art education during the early years in Kelantan, Khalil's awareness of modern art was cultivated through a period of colonialism and the experiences of pioneering artists from the Nanyang Academy.

Khalil is well known for his amazing watercolour paintings, delicate batik works and intriguing acrylics. His artistic talent began as a young boy with a passion for making wayang kulit. He would make the wayang kulit by drawing on a big leaf with the addition of a cardboard, which would then be used to play with his friends. He took this newfound interest and participated in competitions and shows held almost every month. Unfortunately, his mother disapproved of his newly found passion while his father, wanted him to be a teacher. Despite his parents' disapproval, Khalil remained steadfast to his passion.

In pursuit of his passion, he began attending art classes held every Sunday, in Kota Bharu. The art inspector, Nik Mahmud Idris bestowed upon Khalil the art of watercolour and painting techniques. Equipped with the painting techniques that he learnt in the art classes, he allowed his creativity to blossom, which resulted in the scenic landscapes of the Malaysian East Coast in his works, such as the undulating hills and the padi fields. His works generated the interest of army officers and civil servants who went on to purchase many of the paintings he produced. He was a teacher in a primary school, but he painted in his spare time and he travelled from Kelantan periodically to sell his works at the annual MAHA (Malaysian Agriculture and Horticulture Association) trade fair.

### THE TEMERLOH HOUSE

Khalil's initially planned to pursue his studies in the arts in Bandung, Indonesia, but his application wasn't successful. That didn't deter him as he achieved his artistic breakthrough some years later in Pahang around 1957. It was during this period that the artist was first introduced to the District Officer, Claude Gibb Ferguson, previously a District Officer in Perak. Ferguson got on very well with the locals as he spoke good Malay, subsequently inviting Khalil to come over to his house and later asked him to paint an image of it, in Temerloh, Pahang.

It wasn't an easy request for Khalil to complete, but he successfully completed it and other commissions followed suit. He eventually adopted the Temerloh Rest House as an impromptu art gallery, due to the number of travelling dignitaries who had the tendency to stop over at the Rest

House, and would view his works there. This time proved to be a significant one for Khalil as his time was filled with creations of new artworks. Some of the artworks he created in 1957 include, Bachok, Pahang River, the Pahang Series consisting of fishing boats, the river and thatched houses.

One of his most notable commissions in that year was the task to paint the portrait of the Sultan of Pahang – Sultan Abu Bakar Ri'aytuddin Al-Mu'adzam Shah, in conjunction of the Sultan's birthday. With the guidance of Claude Gibb Ferguson, Khalil studied English at Clifford School, Kuala Lipis to gain the necessary language skills for him to continue his art studies in England. While studying at Clifford School, the artist submitted some of his works to enter The Malaysian Way of Life – the Lever Brothers art competition, and received the second prize in that



#### LIFE IN LONDON

Sponsored by the Pahang state government, Khalil continued his studies at the prestigious St. Martins School of Art in London. In the same year, the renowned art critic, Clement Greenberg, visited London and Cornwall, to check out contemporary works of art. The next year, British pop artist Peter Blake joined St. Martins and lectured in the school at the same time Khalil was studying there. David Hockney used to drop by to give the budding art students lectures, and Khalil attended some of those sessions. During his stint there, he continued to study English in evening classes and met the woman who was to be his future wife, ludith Hürzeler, in 1963.

Khalil's 'English' works exposed a comparatively different style from his earlier landscapes and portraits. Influenced by his peers, lecturers, and his foreign surroundings, the early 1960's saw him experimenting with abstraction in works like Destruction and Destruction Il and Abstract I. There are distinct influences of Italian Futurism, both in the movement of the subjects and with his works In Geese and the Figurative Study. His interest in Futurism was shortlived when he began painting his own selfportrait and the Temerloh girl in acrylic. His love for Expressionism was clearly portrayed in the Portrait of a Balinese Lady. His interest in painting abstraction surfaced in other ways throughout his career as an artist.

#### POST ART SCHOOL

Over the span of his artistic career. Khalil's abstraction was overshadowed by his other, more naturalistic works when he produced paintings such as 'Pembicaraan III' in 2002, Velocity IV' in 2003, 'Tangtu and Pura' in 2003, 'Padang Galak' and 'Pabean' in 2004 and the intriguing ink-on-paper set of images from Bali, Indonesia, The Spirit of the East Coast and Sanur. Upon completing his course for the National Diploma of Design in Fine Arts from St. Martins in 1966, Khalil furthered his education at the University of Malaya and became a qualified art teacher. It was during this time that he painted an oil study reminiscent of the Post-Impressionist works of Paul Gauguin – Temerloh Girl. This work is an acrylic, on board, which has all the feel of Gauguin's oil paintings from the South Seas.

At this point, he had already become close friends with Ibrahim Hussein, while visiting Malaysia Hall, in Bryanston Square, London. Khalil also met another famous painter and poet, at the University of Malaya, which was none other than Latiff Mohidin. In 1968, he was given the opportunity to meet Frank Sullivan, former Press Secretary to Malaysia's first Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman Putra Al-Haj. Sullivan was a champion of the arts in Malaysia and was instrumental, along with the prime minister, in the creation of Malaysia's National Art Gallery back in 1958.

Sullivan, the first administrator of the National Art Gallery, had set up the Samat Art Gallery in 1966 with his partner Samat Silat, and encouraged Khalil in his painting and batik images. Sullivan was mainly responsible for Khalil's first solo exhibition at the Samat Art Gallery. This followed with numerous solo exhibitions including in Jakarta, the Gallery of Fine Art, Singapore and again at Samat Art Gallery. In 1971, he hosted an exhibition at the Galeries De la fontaine in Geneva and two years later at the Raya Gallery in Victoria, Australia.

In 1977, Khalil had his works touring New Zealand as part of a University of Malaya exhibition.

Khalil was drawn to observing and depicting the hard working lives of ordinary people influenced by his East Coast upbringing. From his earliest works of Pahang fishing villages, thatched roof dwellings, fishermen hauling their catch, to more enigmatic and stylish beach works, he was definitely in touch not only with his own humble origins but with the heart and soul of the country he loved.

He was one of the few Malaysian contemporary artists who had successfully worked using batik as a medium. 'Gadis' painted in 1968, a portrait of a young girl, is a good example of Khalil's batik work, made shortly after his return to Malaysia, while 'Pantai Timur II' painted in 1985 is a very provocative and strong piece using muted colours, but demonstrates the artist's command of line and details, in his chosen medium.

Due to his affiliation with MAS (Malaysia Airlines) in the 1980's, Khalil became actively involved with the Malaysian Watercolour Association, which held successful exhibitions around Asia, including Hong Kong, Japan and Korea. He continued producing watercolours like Beach Vista in 1990, Sunset in 1991, Berserah in 1994, Kota Bharu and the East Coast Series in 1995. In his brief look at Malaysian art, in Modern Malaysian Art – from the pioneering era to the pluralist era (1930s – 1990s).

His selected group exhibitions included X Biennale, Sao Paulo, Brazil (1971) and Man & His World, Montreal Canada (1970). His subsequent solo exhibitions included Khalil Ibrahim 'The Art Journey' (2015), A Tribute to Khalil Ibrahim (2011), Khalil Ibrahim - A Continued Dialogue, Galeri Petronas (2004) and The Spirit of the East Coast, Yayasan Seni Artisan, Kuala Lumpur (2001).

The past two decades had seen Khalil produce sets of brightly hued watercolour images, acrylics and oils, which have updated his familiar theme of the East Coast beach and young girl series. In his last few watercolours, the viewer is treated to the gaiety of the girls' sarongs and the brightness of their lengthy Malaysian blouses, while they stroll or stand on the beach.

In more recent times, Khalil exhibited around Malaysia and had a number of his works held both in private and public collections including Hilton Hotels, Maybank, Petronas, Bank Negara, and KL Lifestyle Art Space. Wherever his works may be and whichever medium he chose to use, the base of his form and colour was drawing, more specifically the sketches he had always done, culminating in a large number of sketchbooks filled to the very covers with fresh, vibrant sketches.

### HAS SINGING ALWAYS BEEN YOUR PASSION?

Yes, ever since I can remember, I have loved singing. I remember first starting out singing jingles. I believe I am also inclined to singing because I have a musical family. Almost everyone in my family can either sing or play a musical instrument. My uncle was a singer back in the days to a band called Revolvers of which Tony Fernandez was a band member. In addition, my grandfather was a musician, so is my dad and he also sings. However, it was only my uncle and I who pursued singing professionally. In fact, when we were in primary school, we had a form to fill in about one's ambition. At the top of my list was to be a singer. I always knew I wanted to be a singer.

### WHAT INSPIRED YOUR VENTURE INTO THE ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY?

It started in primary school when I used to partake in various singing competitions including Asia Bagus but I only started singing professionally after SPM exam. The last competition that I took part

in was the Golden Teen Search by RTM and that was when I met my late mentor, Adnan Abu Hassan and he was the one who pulled me into the entertainment scene. He wanted to sign me up when he first saw me in the quarter finals of that competition. He was my favourite composer because he helped the biggest singers in the industry at the time to rise to fame, namely Aishah and Fauziah Latiff who were my idols. That was the reason why I told myself that I shouldn't let go of the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. My father, who supported me and brought me to the competitions believed in my talent and knew that I was in good hands with Adnan Abu Hassan.

### YOUR FAVOURITE SINGER OF ALL TIME?

Fauziah Latiff, Aishah and Celine Dion, Basically, all the belters.

### HOW DOES IT FEEL HAVING ONE OF THE BEST VOCAL PITCHES IN MALAYSIA?

It is very scary actually. I wouldn't say that I have the best but if people say so, I am immensely grateful and thankful that I am able to leave that impression on people. That said, I also feel that it is a heavy burden for me, having to meet people's expectations. It also keeps me on my toes to keep delivering my best. I have four kids. Many people told me that I will lose my voice and stamina. In fact, I have seen several singers who were belters experience a drastic change in their voices. It was very scary for me. I am thankful that pregnancy did not affect my voice drastically. I am immensely grateful.





#### TELL US ABOUT YOUR LATEST SINGLE 'MIMPI'.

Mimpi is the product of nine years. I stopped singing for a while to concentrate on business with my husband. I took a brief sabbatical to basically spend time with my family and raise my children. It was after my fourth child, Ibrahim, that I decided to work on a new single and he was two years old at the time. I found the perfect song composed by Hafiz Hamidun and lyrics by Ahmad Fedtri Yahya and almost immediately recorded it. However, I felt like I could have done more justice to the song and re-recorded it. The process of re-recording took about a year as I was swamped with my business and then Gegar Veganza happened. I believe it's a blessing in disguise that it took some time for me to perfect the song. Mimpi is actually relatively new, it was just the process of producing a single that took nine years. So far, the song has been well accepted by fans. Mimpi isn't the only single I will be releasing. I am actually looking for new singles to work on. Mimpi has a storyline of its own. Fedtri Yahya, who is a good friend of mine related to me that this song signified a true story about a couple who got married and they couldn't go experience their honeymoon because a few days after their wedding, the husband met with an accident and slipped into a coma. The lyrics of this song is essentially her expressions and her conscience reaching out to her husband, knowing that she can lose him at any time. For me, Mimpi is about appreciating the time you have with your family and loved ones because life is short and we should spend it wisely.

### HOW DO YOU KEEP YOUR VOICE READY TO BREAK INTO SONG?

I think my friends and those close to me are aware that I don't do specific vocal exercises before I perform. However, I do a lot of breathing exercise. Usually, before I sing, I keep quiet and to myself in order to preserve my voice and only let it out on stage. I make sure that I have a strong stamina too because singing involves cardio and it is essentially about the strength of the core and the diaphragm. Of course, I do physical exercises like running and carrying weights because these really help in singing. It is a discipline I adhere to.

### WHAT JOB DO YOU THINK YOU WOULD BE DOING NOW IF YOU DIDN'T HAVE YOUR MUSIC CAREER?

I'd definitely be a businesswoman. My father is a business owner and my husband is one too. I was brought up with the hectic life of an entrepreneur. So that's definitely something I would turn to. In fact, currently, if I do not have any singing obligations, I conduct my own business which focuses on advertising and events. So if something happens or I decide to retire, then I would have my business to dive into.

### ANY ADVICE FOR ASPIRING SINGERS?

Stay grounded. Once you reach fame, yes, it's wonderful but you have to remember that the world is round. Some people tend to forget that. It is important to have a plan in sustaining yourself, in regards to your voice, your career and everything because the talents of the new generation will creep up on you, so it is important to foresee these things and remember to have a backup plan should

things go sideways. Also, be true to yourself and be true to your intention, be it to reach fame or because you love singing, because when you have passion for what you do, you will go the extra mile for it. Fame is only temporary because the next person will overshadow you in the blink of an eye, so stay true to your intentions.

#### WHAT IS THE SIGNIFICANCE OF EID TO YOU?

Eid is all about forgiveness, family, revelry and all those things balled into one big event, Aidilfitri. For me, Eid is a celebration of your victory going through Ramadan. It's not only about the celebrated, but the success of fasting for a month and you reflect, try to be a better Muslim, a better person, you try to upgrade yourself spiritually. Whether you succeed in doing all these aforementioned things is how you celebrate Aidilfitri. People tend to forget that. I will try to instil these values and understanding in my children about Aidilfitri and Ramadan. Aidifitri and Ramadan will come and go but we must always know why it's celebrated. However, being a Malaysian, it of course involves food. Food is everything during Raya. Being amongst family members and visiting are also noble things practise.

#### ANY TRADITIONS YOU OBSERVE DURING EID?

We make sure the morning after the Aidilfitri prayers, we all gather round and eat breakfast together. We wait for the male members of the family to return from the mosque and eat together. We tend to dismiss eating together by saying we have no time to wait but it is actually important. It instils a sense of togetherness. That is our tradition.

#### DO YOU HAVE A THEME FOR YOUR RAYA OUTFITS THIS YEAR?

This year, I would love for my kids and I to wear kebarung. Kebarung is a combination of kebaya and kurung. Kurung has a panel at the side which makes it a little looser and it follows the cutting and of athekebaya. So happens that this year, all the traditional materials such as brocade are coming back so it is a good time to wear a kebarung, not to mention in trend.

#### **FAVOURITE RAYA DISH?**

That's very difficult. One dish that comprises different elements which I can't go without during Raya is nasi himpit with rendang daging, kuah kacang and masak lodeh. It's the perfect Raya dish for me.

#### WHAT MAKES YOU HAPPIEST?

A lot of things actually. I'm easily entertained. I'm happiest to be with my kids no matter how irritating and crazy they make me. The happiest moment is when I reach home, open the door and they scream mama! That is my happiest moment right before they make their demands.

### FINALLY, WHAT'S NEXT FOR LIZA HANIM?

There will be a concert very soon. That's all I can say for now. That's the biggest thing in my life that is taking place very soon. I haven't had a concert in my entire career and I am very excited because I have wanted this for the longest time. I'm having mixed emotions right now between feeling ecstatic and nervous but it will be a treat for my fans. That's for sure.



# THE REBIRTH OF MALAYSIA

he public has spoken. Malaysia's recent 14th general election (GE14) on May 9, 2018 has brought upon a new hope for the people and country. Malaysians from all walks of life and demographic backgrounds made their way in droves to the polls to make a change for the country.

Campaigning by the contesting parties had been intense. On the eve of GE14, various parts of the country, especially in busy Kampung Baru in the heart of the capital city, took on a festive atmosphere, with several people in cars and pick-up trucks, and on motorcycles circling the streets and waving party flags, honking and blowing their vuvuzelas. What a din!

Along Jalan Tuanku Abdul Rahman and Jalan Kuching, scores of motorists caused a traffic crawl when they parked their vehicles by the roadside to wave their party flags and cheered. Here again, the PKR flag representing the opposition coalition of Pakatan Harapan (PH) comprising PKR, DAP, Amanah and Parti Pribumi Bersatu Malaysia (PPBM) dominated.

There were 222 parliamentary seats and 505 state seats to be contested. Polling was generally smooth although there were some heated arguments between election officials and voters at certain polling stations. The voter turn-out was over 80 percent. After the votes were counted, voters waited in anticipation for the results as this general election was not anything like those before.

The first result that came was Barisan Nasional (BN) winning the Kalabakan parliamentary seat in Sabah. Then the results came trickling in with BN and PH racing almost neck-to-neck. Around 10.30pm, they stopped coming while news filtered through that PH had won with a simple majority of 112 seats. After all the results were tallied in the wee hours, Malaysians woke up to the dawn of a new era.

The final tally was PH winning 113 parliamentary seats, BN (79), PAS (18) and others (12), ending BN's power grip since the country's independence in 1957.

It was a stunning, extraordinary victory as most political observers and commentators had predicted that PH would not win and that BN could even obtain a bigger majority. On the eve of GE14, the then Prime Minister Datuk Seri Najib Tun Razak had confidently said that BN would win with two-thirds majority. However, his nemesis and former Prime Minister Tun Dr Mahathir Mohamed was adamant that PH would come out victorious.

While the PH members and supporters rejoiced over the unprecedented victory, the drastic loss for BN was utterly shocking for its leaders, members and supporters as the ruling coalition even lost its fortress Johor, the birthplace of UMNO, and its fixed deposit, Sabah. BN only won three states – Perlis, Pahang (Najib's home state) and Sarawak, while PAS retained Kelantan and recaptured Terenaganu.

It has been said by commentators that Malaysia had done the impossible and achieved a peaceful transition of power - there were no street demonstrations and violence. The GE14 outcome was also touted as a win for democracy in Southeast Asia where authoritarian leaders often lock up opponents and stifle free speech. Malaysia is also said to have set a world benchmark in how to reclaim democracy against all odds.

It was not a Chinese tsunami like in GE13 and neither was it a Malay tsunami, but a people tsunami led by the 93-year-old Dr Mahathir who has gone into the Guinness Book of World Records as the oldest living prime minister. He was instrumental in galvanising support and bringing together four different political parties in toppling a government that was mired in corruption scandals, embezzlement, wastage, violation of the laws with impunity and other misdeeds. Many believe that without Dr Mahathir leading the pack, victory for PH could not have been possible.

On May 10, after a six-hour wait, Dr Mahathir who was Malaysia's fourth prime minister, was sworn in as its seventh prime minister before Yang di-Pertuan Agong, Sultan Muhammad V. True to his character and leadership style, he immediately got down to work to chart a new era and destiny for Malaysia.

AS HARI RAYA APPROACHES, IT'S THAT TIME OF THE YEAR WHEN STORES ARE FLOCKED BY SHOPPERS HUNTING FOR THEIR FESTIVE NEEDS. FROM HOME DÉCOR TO RAYA FASHION TO GROCERIES, THERE'S NO DOUBT THAT PEOPLE WILL BE CHASING ALL THE TOP SALES AND DEALS AVAILABLE IN THE MARKET. EVEN WHEN YOU'VE COMPLETED SHOPPING, YOU MAY REALISE YOU HAVE OVER PREPARED OR SOMETIMES YOU HAVEN'T PREPARED ENOUGH. TO EASE YOUR RAYA EXPERIENCE THIS SEASON, HERE ARE SOME TIPS FOR YOU.

### DECIDE YOUR RAYA FASHION STYLE AND COLOUR BEFOREHAND

Hari Raya is the time to glam up your traditional wear for the festivity. When you plan to colour code with your family or wear a particular style, make a decision ahead. Whether it's songket, batik or peplum, it's easier when you already know what you want to wear. There are many choices and places to shop for a Raya outfit, leaving you confused and indecisive. Knowing what to wear, where to go and what to buy beforehand will save you a lot of time and energy.

### DECIDE ON A RAYA MENU AND FOLLOW THROUGH

Usually for Hari Raya, we cook large quantities of food to serve our guests for our open house. Family, friends and relatives would visit day after day, so it's wise to have your dishes ready at hand. Therefore, it's good to set a menu that you would like to cook for Raya and firmly follow through with it. If it's as simple as ketupat, beef rendang and chicken rendang, list the ingredients you need and go! There will be a lot of people going

to the supermarket during this time and the demand for meat is especially high. So you have to strategise your grocery shopping. The more time you waste, the more the ingredients you need will sell out. If you decide to get a caterer, book them as soon as possible.

### SAVE YOUR CHANGE

At least a month or two before Raya, start saving your small change. Whether it's RM1, RM5 or RM10, set it aside for duit raya. This will come in handy and it makes it easier for you later on as you won't have to get that many small change from the bank, especially when you've been busy and you need it at the last minute when you don't have enough. It's best to accumulate small change earlier on.

### LABEL THE NAMES OF DUIT RAYARECIPIENTS

There are times when we miscalculate the duit raya that we intend to give. It's always a good idea to make a list of who gets how much. When you've sorted the money allocation, be sure to label the envelopes with the name of the recipients. In that way, you won't miss out on anyone.

### AVOID IMPULSE BUYING

Most people tend to spend more than necessary for the festive season. Raya sales are everywhere and restraining oneself from the temptation of wanting to buy everything is difficult. When there are sales, people tend to buy more. Know the difference between what you want and what you need. List what you need and focus on the list. Avoid impulse buying as much as you can. You'll be surprised how much you'll be able to save from doing so.

### BUY KUIH RAYA THAT YOU ENJOY MOST

One of the most common issues in many households is the wastage of kuih raya. Often we buy too many types of kuih raya. Most often, visitors prefer certain types of kuih raya more than the others, leaving some of the kuih raya untouched and going to waste. There's no point of buying kuih raya that people don't enjoy eating. I personally suggest that you buy a few that you personally love eating in a large quantity, so more people get to enjoy these.

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For thousands of years people have used meditation to move beyond the mind's stress-inducing thoughts and emotional upsets into peace and clarity. Given the day and age we live in, stress is ever prevalent, hence the need to mentally rejuvenate and find peace. While there are countless meditation techniques and practices, the steps below offer a simple way to begin. Remember, while meditating, there is always room for improvement and a chance to learn something new. Try to enjoy the journey as you hone your meditation skills.

#### Choose to Start

Meditation starts with you. It is your decision to begin and when you need motivation, try tracing back to the reason you wanted to try meditation in the first place. Meditation is known to provide relief to stress and anxiety, promote physical and mental wellbeing, and it can be a spiritual experience.

### **Pick Your Location Wisely**

Your ambience plays a vital role in cultivating the right experience. It is crucial to settle in a peaceful, quiet space that helps you feel relaxed. When the optimal location is not available, remember, your car or even work desk can serve as your very own meditation retreat. When you are giving a go at meditation, just remember to look for a space that allows you the freedom to meditate without interruptions.

#### Set a Timer

Meditation may seem daunting to many because of the notion that it might take hours. Actually, meditation does not have to be a long process unless you choose for it to be. If you are just starting out, kick it off with small increments of time. Setting a timer is very helpful, especially for beginners because it aids you to focus on breathing and not on the clock. Initially, set the timer for two minutes, and do your best to stay focused and in the moment. As your confidence builds, try extending the timer by 30 seconds every session until you are meditating for five minutes or longer.

### **Focus On Your Breathing**

One of the best ways that helps me in my meditation is to focus on my breathing. Choose a pose (preferably cross-legged with hands on your legs) and follow your breath as it flows from your nose into your lungs and out again as you exhale. While some may find it helpful to count breaths, it isn't necessary. What concentrating on your breathing does is, it helps your mind focus as it adjusts to the silence. Seasoned meditators also pay close attention to their breathing as a way to be more mindful.

#### **Return When You Wander**

Most meditation practices aim to clear the brain of all thoughts and be more mindful. However, it is natural and even inevitable that your mind will wander or fixate on rotating feelings and physical sensations. Getting lost in these distractions is entirely normal, but not the goal of meditation. When this happens to you, recognise that your mind has wandered and try to refocus on your breathing.

#### **End Your Session on a Positive Note**

Carry your mindfulness through to the end of your session. Slowly get up and take note of how you feel. Breathe in deeply and gently adjust your body and mind. Creating a personal ritual to end each session may be helpful. Ending the ritual could include reciting a personal mantra or finishing with a light exercise or walk.

#### Repeat Often

Meditation is like a supplement; it supports a healthy body and mind. It promotes healthy blood pressure, a happier mood, and strengthens coping skills. However, in order to experience these benefits, you have to make it a point to meditate regularly and eventually, make it a habit. Try picking a time and place every day where you can dedicate two to five minutes to meditate.

I play my part in community service on a personal basis as well. Two years ago, I formed a group called Stop The Hunger with a group of friends, where we provided free meals to the homeless around Kuala Lumpur on a monthly basis. Recently I have found a new passion for educating children who cannot afford it. God willing, I have been able to assist in the education of a couple of students. In the future, I would want to be

able to help more children with education, to make sure they have the privilege of knowledge that I was blessed enough to have.

### What is your biggest goal in life?

My biggest goal in life is to always stay happy and be a constant source of inspiration to others.

### How would you define beauty?

ot every eatery can pull off fusion dishes. Table9 however does it so subtly and effortlessly. It's no wonder that less than a year since its inception, it's doing tremendously well. According to the owner, Table9 was aimed to be a café concept, yet serves delicious Italian food with a little mix of Korean flavours. At the same time, a lot of the dishes were designed to suit the local taste. A few of the dishes even incorporate local influences.

The food clearly exhibits dedication in terms of quality and preparation. You can really tell by the taste of the meal you're presented with. That is because the owner would come in to check on the food to ensure that patrons are served the best of quality. From the presentation to the taste, ratio and portion, the owner is hands-on. The staff are guided closely so that anyone who comes to eat is able to relish the experience fully.

The highlight and my personal favourite dish would be Table9's Picante Seafood Pasta. The texture of the pasta was perfect, packed with flavour of the sauce. The sauce was rich and creamy, with a kick of spice that didn't overwhelm the dish. The seafood was fresh and aplenty with juicy shrimps, thick mussels and delicious squids. It was a heavenly seafood mix with creamy pasta goodness. This dish is a must-try. However, they have a variety of pastas. From the classic Marinara and Alfredo to other unique tastes of Rosé and Caprese Pasta, they're all to die for. The also have a range of olive oil pastas and risotto.

Their pizzas are also amazing. Whether it's onion-or tomato-based, you'll enjoy it immensely. One of their recent new additions is the Popeye Pizza. Fresh baby spinach on top of the cheesy tomato-based crust is simply scrumptious. It is a great balance between guilty pleasure and healthy. If you would like to try something unique and different, be sure to try the Pizza Miele e Formaggio, a gorgonzola cheese and honey on a crisp pizza base. Their other pizzas such as the Margherita, and Frutti de Mare are just as enticing. If you want a pizza that is meaty with a little Korean twist, the Bulgogi Pizza is the choice.

At Table9, you are spoilt for choice. Their mains are tempting such as the Salmon Steak, pan-seared and served with roasted vegetables and citrus sauce. Their meaty Lamb Shank explodes with the flavour of your choice of sauce, blackpepper or demi-

I love how the sweetness and spiciness don't overpower. Another hot seller is the Honey Butter Garlic, and if you want to challenge yourself for something that is even spicier, try the Insane Chicken Wings. Do note that every Tuesday, if you order one drink you'll get half price for any chicken wings except for the Cheesy Cheese Chicken Wings.

Their desserts too are irresistible. Their lineup of Bingsu is sure one of a kind. The Rose Bingsu is said to be the locals' top favourite. Currently, there is a new addition which is the Cendol Bingsu. Shave iced-milk with cendol green bits and red beans. There are other cakes, coffees and juices as well. The cutest thing is that when you order a drink, it'll be accompanied by a mini buoy, brought by the owner from Korea.

The interior is very café-like, which is the current trend in Korea. Contemporary with hints of greenery and modern Korean touches in the décor. Also, you can buy decorative items like mini buoys and dried flowers that are displayed on the shelves at the entrance of the eatery for customers who are interested.



Besides the renowned and commercialised eateries tourists and locals flock to, there are unbeknownst gems all over Melaka just awaiting to charm you senseless. ### WILSON CHICKEN RICE

Wilson Chicken Rice is a local favourite and is now ours too! Perhaps it's the fragrant rice or the fresh, roasted, flavourful chicken that is a hit; either way, we had second helpings. This famous chain of restaurant is sprawled around Melaka town. The oldest, however, is the Wilson Chicken Rice at Bandar Kaba. Given its scrumptious offerings, it is not unusual that it is crowded, especially during peak hours. Aside from the signature chicken rice, they also offer innards and their deep-fried chicken intestines are a big hit. It reminds us of a crunchy 'keropok'.



### WANTAN MEE AT HONG HOCK RESTAURANT

Hock Hock Restaurant is run by a Peranakan family and home to two amazing dishes, one being the wantan mee and the other, nasi lemak. We were especially intrigued by the Wantan Mee. Though simple in presentation, its flavours teased our taste buds and left a savoury aftertaste. It comes with a chicken dumpling soup that goes together with the Wantan Mee like PB and J. While most Wantan Mee in Kuala Lumpur and other regions are served alongside pork, Hong Hock's Wantan Mee is only served with chicken, because of their Peranakan descent, which we found refreshing. Patrons can choose between a small bowl or a big one and we suggest go big or go home.



### DAHLIA RIA CORNER ASAM PEDAS

Asam Pedas can be found ubiquitously in Melaka, having originated from this state. One of the best hidden gems in our opinion is the Asam Pedas at Dahlia Ria Corner, Batu Berendam. Situated in the humble locale of a pasar borong(wholesale market), this hole in the wall will win you over by thick, savoury broth which you should generously drizzle over the white rice. With every spoonful, complement it with a pinch of sambal belacan, the fish of your choice and egg. When we tried it, we were literally doing a happy bounce on our seats. The highlight of this place besides its asam pedas is its hospitality. The staff are ever smiling and ever ready to recommend the types of fish to go with the asam pedas. ### Tepung Pelita







good luck, great support and determination, I was ecstatic to be able to complete my goals. I realised that I'm very blessed and one doesn't get through all these on one's


#### WHY CARDIOLOGY?

As an analogy, take for example how a heart pumps; a heart pumps based on an electrical system. Should the first battery fail, there is a backup and if the second battery fails, there is also a backup. I cannot imagine that this is a coincidence or unplanned. When people become unwell with concerns to their heart, it is rather intense and I think it was the adrenaline of it all that drew me into cardiology. It is

### **ENLIGHTEN US ON CARDIOLOGY AND** WHAT A CARDIOLOGIST DOES.

Cardiology is about the prevention and treatment of heart diseases. The most common type of heart diseases we see in Malaysia and elsewhere is atherosclerosis,





which is blockages of the arteries. The most common cause of death is coronary heart disease and stroke which laymen would refer to as blockages of the arteries. So, cardiology is largely about the prevention of that end-stage outcome. Our role is that when patients come in, we assess them and depending on whether they have the blockage, we educate them on prevention and we treat their conditions.

### IS HEART DISEASE PREVENTABLE AND AT WHAT AGE SHOULD THE PREVENTION BEGIN?

Coronary artery disease as a major factor in causing death was non-existent until after World War II. It tells us that there was a change. What the change is in history but that is a different subject altogether. We have to start prevention at the very earliest, when in school. The first major thing to do is to practise a healthy lifestyle that many talk about

but not many Malaysians indulge in. It includes a healthy diet and good physical exercise. Then, further down the track, we have to look at our own genes. If our family has more risks that lead to heart disease such as hypertension, diabetes and hypercholesterolemia, we would have to pay extra attention, see a doctor and treat it with lifestyle changes or medicine. But coming back to what I said, it's largely preventable and the prevention is lifestyle and to treat the risk factors if there are. The change in lifestyle also includes an important aspect which is the avoidance of cigarette smoking.

### WHAT IS THE MOST INTERESTING CASE YOU HAVE EVER RECEIVED?

A case that comes to mind is of a young lady who just delivered a child a few weeks. She was in Indonesia and collapsed at home. She was rushed to the hospital and at that stage, couldn't breathe. They had to insert a tube and put

her on oxygen. The doctors there thought she had a weak heart, something known to happen after delivery. The lady's family asked for an urgent transfer and was flown by air ambulance to the hospital here. Upon assesing, we thought that she suffered from post-partum cardiomyopathy. We realised there was something not quite right with her situation and assumed she did not have any other illness. Then, it dawned on us that it wasn't post-partum cardiomyopathy but turned out that she had a heart attack which was immensely shocking because she was only in her 30's. Apparently, she had a very strong family history of heart disease. We took her in very soon after her arrival to perform angioplasty which she survived but remained unwell for all these years. What was interesting about this case was that it was so shocking to have a young lady who had just delivered a child to have a heart attack. It was a particularly intriguing case that I have yet to experience again.

As our beloved country ushers in a new chapter in its history, Malaysia Airports looks forward to develop and further advance our local aviation industry to greater heights. Having achieved record results for the financial year ended 31 December 2017, we are certainly not resting on our laurels.

In fact, we have set our sights to cross the RM2 billion mark for the fiscal year 2018 where our earnings before interest, tax, depreciation and amortisation is concerned. From the RM2.09 billion target that we have set, we expect RM1.2 billion of the contributions to come from our Malaysian operations while some RM881 million will be from our Istanbul Sabiha Gokcen International Airport (ISGIA) in Turkey, whose second runway is expected to be ready by then.

We expect the growth of our 100% owned Turkish operations to be driven more significantly by international arrivals. Accounting currently for a third of the total 31.3 million passengers to ISGIA, our goal is to increase its international traffic to 40% by next year. We remain committed to bring in strategic investors to leverage on our optimisation for this airport and have, meanwhile, narrowed our discussions with two parties.

Besides Turkey and Qatar, we see tremendous opportunities to expand our presence in Asia. India, which has privatised their main airports and announced 50 new airports yet to be privatised, is of great interest to us. While we look for the right partners, we will continue to be prudent in our investment approach. With a track record of managing 40 airports that include large hubs such as KLIA and ISGIA, regional international airports, domestic airports and smaller operations, this combination makes us very attractive to our potential partners.

Airport MD Speaks

One of Malaysia's most highly regarded corporate leaders lays his considerable expertise and experience to raise Malaysia Airports to higher levels.

This month, Datuk Badlisham shares how the airport operator is all geared up to maintain its earnings momentum for 2018 and improve the service standards of its airports that are undergoing optimisation, including its Turkish operations.

On the home front, we are enhancing and expanding our airports in Kota Bharu, Langkawi, Penang, Sandakan, Kuching and Kota Kinabalu, just to name a few of them. All this is part of the commercial reset that we have planned for 2018-19. In order to remain relevant to the needs of our customers, airline partners and other stakeholders, it is necessary for us to refresh our offerings, especially at KL International Airport (KLIA), which is celebrating its 20th anniversary this month.

As part of our service improvements for KLIA, we hope to move its ranking to be among the world's top 10 this year in the prestigious Airport Service Quality survey organised by the Airports Council International, which serves 641 members operating 1,953 airports in 176 countries. Currently, KLIA is placed 12th in over 40 million passengers per annum category.



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### **KLIA TURNS 20**

Officially inaugurated on 27 June 1998 in time for the Commonwealth Games, Malaysia's state-of-the-art KL International Airport (KLIA) has served the nation well as a premier gateway, bagging a number of accolades over the years and earning its recognition in a number of areas ranging from immigration services to its green efforts.

Comprising a main terminal building, satellite building and contact pier, KLIA Main was designed by renowned Japanese architect, the late Kisho Kurokawa to be an "airport in the forest, forest in the airport" and can handle up to 25 mppa.

In 2004, KLIA became the world's first and only airport to attain the Green Globe 21 certification and went to receive for five consecutive years recognition from this worldwide benchmarking and certification programme that facilitates sustainable travel and tourism for consumers, companies and communities

Fast forward 20 years later after its opening, with KLIA Main almost nearing 30 mppa capacity, initial planning for its upgrade and expansion that will increase its capacity by another 15 and 20 million more passengers within the next five years has started.

Malaysia Airports managing director Datuk Badlisham Ghazali assures that KLIA Main still has ample capacity to cater to future increase in passenger traffic growth, highlighting that a number of enhancements and reconfigurations have been done to ensure more efficient use of check-in counters and smoother passenger flow, including at its retail areas.

Monthly data from the airport operator submitted to Bursa Malaysia or local bourse for April shows KLIA Main's last 12-month figure standing at 28.1 million for 2018, up 1.6% year-on-year. Of this total, international arrivals have been on the uptrend, making up 22.5 million.

Combined with the 31.4 million passenger traffic at klia2, its second terminal which was opened in 2014, KLIA's passenger traffic totals 59.4 million based on the last-12-month count. These two terminals, with a combined capacity of 75 mppa and direct connections to over 120 destinations worldwide, will help to strengthen KLIA's position as the next generation hub.

Leveraging on its hub strategy and global passenger traffic uptrends to establish itself as the preferred hub for the 10-member Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) with a total population size of 600 million, KLIA is the only airport in this region to have three independent runways.

According to Airports Council International's (ACI) newly released preliminary figures, KLIA remains among the top 20 world airports in 2017 for international passenger traffic, moving up two notches from 2016 to rank 12 with 42.3 million international passengers.



Data from Malaysia Airports shows that about 83% of KLIA's total international passenger movements, excluding transfer and transit passengers, are from Asia with Southeast Asia accounting for 47% followed by Northeast Asia (23%), South Asia (12.4%) and Central Asia (0.2%).

The top 10 countries contributing to this growth are Indonesia, China, Thailand, Singapore, India, Australia, Hong Kong, Japan, UAE and Taiwan.

Meanwhile, the 10 highest growth international performance for 2017 at KLIA Main/klia2 comes from Shenzen Airlines, AirAsia Zest, VietJet Air, All Nippon Airways, Regent Airways, Thai AirAsia, Malindo Air, Indonesia AirAsiaX, Xiamen Airlines and Lion Air while the main contributors for its domestic traffic are from AirAsia, Malaysia Airlines and Malindo Air.

With the new KL Air Traffic Control Centre scheduled to be operational in 2019, KLIA is expected to handle beyond its present 78 flight movements per hour to 108 flight movements per hour.



Besides the expansion plans for its contact pier at the 20-year old KLIA Main, which is expected to start in later part in 2019, Badlisham says optimisation works to maximise operational efficiency and improve customers' experiences at KLIA are on-going.

Among them would be the aerotrain upgrade and baggage handling main sorter system replacement programme at KLIA Main over the next three years. It also involves a major refurbishment of its washrooms at the airport.

#### **Commercial Reset**

Identifying other drivers of growth areas in 2018, Badlisham discloses that the airport operator is in the midst of implementing some commercial resets, starting with KLIA and klia2 before proceeding to its other international airports.

He deems it necessary to refresh Malaysia Airports' commercial offerings over the next two to three years as part of the efforts to strengthen its non-aeronautical business, pointing out that the board of directors has approved of the strategy.

Upon completion, visitors and passengers alike to KLIA can thus expect to enjoy a lot more experiential shopping, high-end fashion offerings, products that are exclusive to the airport, and also larger retail formats.

Since January this year, Malaysia Airports has appointed Mohammad Suhaimi Abd Mubin as acting senior general manager of its wholly-owned subsidiary, Malaysia Airports (Sepang) Sdn Bhd, to be responsible for running this flagship airport.

He certainly has his hands full managing the country's largest airport, which saw 69 airlines, including those handling cargo services, flying in last year compared to 39 airlines in 1998.



Mohammad Suhaimi said KLIA has grown from passenger volume of 6.67 million in 1998 to 58.5 million in 2017 with relatively high growth of routes frequency from 2001.

"The operational efficiencies have also been upgraded to meet our passengers' new expectations besides engaging into innovative technology enhancements like free WiFi in the airport, passenger check-in kiosks and automated bag drops."

Expecting to see many upcoming initiatives to enhance customers' experience as they breeze through the airport, he attributes KLIA's achievements to the contributions from the airport community, including airlines, to promote the airport as a preferred hub in Asia.

"Credit should also go to Ministry of Transport, Civil Aviation Authority Malaysia, the Immigration and Custom departments, Health Ministry, Royal Malaysia Police as well as ground handlers, commercial partners/ retailers and contractors.

"Our aspiration is for KLIA to be one of the world's best airports and an aeropolis city that will support our country's economic growth."

He added, "Reaching for our phone to find the way is now second-nature and our interactive airport maps will help ensure a more seamless and relaxed trip through the terminal for our customers wherever and whenever they fly".



Available for IOS and Android, the new airport maps will be available on the free SkyTeam app for all the alliance's 39 main hubs, including co-location terminals and the seven airports with SkyTeam-branded airport lounges: Beijing, Dubai, Hong Kong, Istanbul, London Heathrow, Sydney and Vancouver.


# Aviation Interview with **Dato' Sri Azharuddin Abdul Rahman**

Chairman, Civil Aviation Authority of Malaysia (CAAM)

When Dato' Sri Azharuddin, 60, retired in February after serving 11 years as the Department of Civil Aviation's (DCA) directorgeneral, he opted for a one-year contract extension. It proved to be shortlived as he soon found himself appointed chairman of the newly formed CAAM and tasked with rebranding his former agency into an autonomous federal statutory body.

He has the enviable job of juggling CAAM's two important responsibilities. Besides being the regulator for technical, safety and national security involving the aviation industry, flight operations, air worthiness and engineering, it is also a service provider for air traffic management. Having been in this industry for 42 years, Dato' Sri Azharuddin believes "you have to love what you do" to stay in it for so long.

Engrossed with restructuring his former outfit and strengthening its in-house operations, he will find it even more difficult now to squeeze time for a round of golf with his friends but the man has no regrets for the career path that he has chosen since he left his Lower Form Six studies to be trained as a licensed aircraft engineer.



Our main aim is to rebrand DCA. There is much to do, including changing the way we have been doing things before. In restructuring DCA, we are pushing for the civil aviation authority in Malaysia to be semi-autonomous, if not autonomous.

As an authority, we want the freedom to hire and be able to offer a more attractive remuneration package in order to retain the right mix of qualified and experienced technical personnel for the industry. Although we follow the government's salary scheme now, our board can approve technical allowances for qualified personnel.

# As an independent regulatory body, CAAM's responsibilities include the safety and security of the civil aviation operations in the country. What are some of the challenges faced?

We need trained staff like inspectors to conduct audit surveillance and the certification of aircraft, operators or new airports efficiently and fast. Currently, we are downsized in terms of qualified technical personnel, especially for flight operations and at the aerodromes standards. To be more competent, CAAM requires experienced people with knowledge. That applies to the aviation security staff as well

With safety and security of paramount importance in aviation, we will, for instance, suspend pilots who fly without license. We have legislations like the Aviation Offences Act 1984 and International Civil Aviation Organisation's latest annex No. 19 on safety management system to govern any unsafe situation or procedure. Each state is also required to have their own safety programme, which is more like risk management.

# How is CAAM facilitating in the development of civil aviation skills and professionals like air traffic control officers (ATCOs) in the country?

Our college, the Malaysian Aviation Academy, trains our own ATCOs and those from overseas like from Brunei and Bangladesh. We used to train those from Nepal and Bahrain. There are two levels of air traffic control (ATC) staff. The ATCOs must have a professional degree while their assistants are required to have a diploma as minimum aualification.

The zero-based training takes 22 weeks. Once they pass the examinations, they will put on the job training in the control tower. Upon acquiring the necessary skills, they will be given a rating at the respective airfields.

# Air traffic management is one of the nine divisions in CAAM. How many ATCOs do you have to-date? Are they sufficient to meet the nation's needs?

Currently, we have 1,181 ATCOs but are now down by 212 ATCOs because some have resigned and retired.. Training new staff to replace the retirees and ensuring that they are equipped with the qualifications and ratings is not so straightforward. A number of the staff have also been lured to work in the Middle East due to better remuneration.

# The KL International Airport (KLIA) is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year. Having seen this airport grown through, what are some memorable highlights for you?


Seeing KLIA grow from day one and expand to include klia2 with more passenger and aircraft movements is great. KLIA, with its three runways now, started with about 360 movements or basically take-offs and landings. With KLIA averaging around 1,100 aircraft movements now, we are talking about 550 take-offs daily! I am looking forward to see its 78 movements per hour improve to 108 by 2019 when the new air traffic control centre at KLIA is completed by 2019 to replace the existing one at Subang.

# Your job requires you to be 24/7 on call. Do you have time to unwind then and spend with your family?

I take time off during weekends to spend with my family and have dinner or lunch at least once a week with them. I have four children and three grandsons. I like to read, especially on aviation and would buy any novel that has a picture of aviation on it. Watching sports programmes like the English Premier League and Formula One is another form of relaxation for me as I was active in sports during my school days. I love to watch cooking programmes on the television as well. If I weren't an engineer, I think I would have been a chef!

# NAHO MIYAMOTO

"Malaysians eat all the time"

Meet Naho Miyamoto, a friendly Japanese who is always all smiles with a warm personality to boot. After living in Malaysia the first time in 2008 and leaving two years later, Miyamoto returned once more and continued living in Malaysia for another six and a half years, thus giving her almost a decade worth of experience in Malaysia.



I'm from Osaka, which is known for its good food, especially delicious fried food. I grew up in Osaka and studied all the way until university. I graduated from Kindai University majoring in agriculture. Then I went to Ireland to study English.

# What is it that you do in Malaysia?

I mainly worked as a coordinator between Japan and Malaysia for Asahi Group, which bought over Permanis. When I joined, a lot of adjustments were made in terms of the structure of the organisation. We brought in some technical support from Japan to ensure that the branch here is similar to the headquarters in Japan. I also worked closely with the research and development division during the taste testing of beverages as well. But I left and currently I'm working as a translator.

# Was it difficult to adjust living in Malaysia?

It wasn't difficult to adjust because by the time I came to Malaysia, I was already

used to living in a foreign country. Also, it's within Asia so it was actually easier to adapt compared to when I went to England or Ireland. The food here is similar, still Asian. To find Japanese food is also very easy. When I first came, I learned Malay but I didn't have much opportunity to speak it because here in the city, most Malaysians speak English.

# Do you have a favourite Malaysian food?

I have tried many Malaysian food. I have a favourite food from each of the main ethnic groups in Malaysia. For Malay food, I love beef satay. For Chinese food, I love the chicken rice. For Indian food, I love egg


# What are your favourite places to visit?



# What is your advice for future expats coming to Malaysia?

For those who plan to come to Malaysia, or any country actually, it's important to remember that every country is different in their ways and culture. What might be common sense to you may not be in the country you're visiting. So be sure to go to a country with an open mind and don't just stick to your common sense as it's very subjective and it depends on the country. Like in Japan, when we plan to meet at 5pm, we'll meet exactly at 5pm. Here, the 5pm means 5pm or after. Be understanding of the way people in their country live their lives.

Liu learned under Liu Haisu, a formidable name in the contemporary Chinese art scene from 1896 to 1944. Liu Haisu paved the way in the introduction of Western oil painting skills into traditional inkwash creations, hence Liu Kang's devotion in using canvas instead of rice paper.

Liu Kang graduated from Shanghai Xinhua Arts Academy in 1928, and soon after, he left for Paris. It is during his five-year stay there that he established his personal style an integration of Western and Chinese art. During this time, he became captivated by Impressionism and his works illustrated traces of Gaugin, Cezanne, Picasso, Matisse and

in art, Liu Kang was also recognised for his involvement in developing the Nanyang style. His works involved the use of Western painting materials and tools but essentially, his style and substance are Chinese and the realms of his paintings are typically Oriental.


It is evident that the artist's works embody a repeated theme, the scenes of tropical life. On the account of this, he was considered the founder of "Nanyang" or Southern Sea style and presented his own interpretation of the genre. In 1952, Liu Kang, Chen Chong Swee, Chen Wen Hsi and Cheona Soo Piena went on a historic field trip to Bali in search of a visual expression that was Southeast Asian. Liu drew much inspiration from this trip which inspired some of his latter figurative works.

In recognition of the artist's lifetime accomplishments and contributions to Singapore's visual art scene, Liu was awarded the Public Service Star in 1970, and the Meritorious Service Medal in 1996. In May 2003, the then 92-year-old artist gifted the Sinaapore Art Museum with a predominant part of his paintings and sketches, measuring to over 1,000 pieces. He had also unveiled a painting entitled 'Offerings', depicting three Balinese women, each carrying a basket of offerings, which is symbolic of his personal offering to the museum and country.

Celebrating a century of Liu Kang's birth, the National Art Gallery, Singapore, together with the Global Chinese Arts & Culture Society and Lianhe Zaobao hosted a forum titled, "Liu Kang: Tropical Vanguard" in 2011. The forum congregated a panel of established artists and scholars to discuss Liu Kang's significant influence and contributions to Singapore's art history, the local and international perspectives of this pioneering artist, as well as Liu Kang's many facets as a leader and visionary of the Singapore art community.

A legendary pioneer artist of the Nanyang style

In 1929. Chen went to Swatow at the age of 21 and later his works were displayed for exhibitions in Shanghai (1931, 1933) and Guanazhou (1932, 1936). It was not until 1937 that he was acknowledged for his talent and received praises from a Chinese painter, Xu Beihong, at the second Chinese National Art Exhibition in Nanjing. He was even elected as one of China's contemporary ten greatest artists by an English art magazine in that same year. He left China in 1947 and started touring for art exhibitions in Saigon (1948), Hong Kong (1949), Bangkok-Kuala

Lumpur (1949), and Bangkok-Singapore (1950). He settled in Singapore and was teaching art at the Chinese High School (1949-1968) and the Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts (1951–1959). Then he retired from teaching in 1968 to focus on his art.

Chen was adept at both traditional Chinese ink and Western oil painting. His Westernstyle works in the early 1950's were realistic depictions infused with post-impressionistic and expressionistic elements. He experimented with various styles and techniques ranging from Fauvism to Cubism as well as acrylic, viscous paints and sand on canvas. His art evolved over time and transformed from simplified forms and strong colours to cubism, and later abstraction.

He had great interest in human figures and perceived them in the simplest of manner by merely depicting them as a pattern of images. He was also keen on nature and animals. Other than human figures, his other subjects included landscapes, figures, birds and other animals, still life studies and abstract compositions. His attention to detail and sensitive transcription of illustrating his subject to canvas, especially his work on the aibbon paintings where he was inspired by Mu Xi's works, were highly noted by art experts and aficionados in his time.

For his contributions to fine arts in Singapore, Chen was awarded the Public Service Star in 1964 by President Yusof Ishak. He received an honorary degree of Doctor of Letters by the then President Benjamin Sheares in 1975 and was the first Singaporean artist to be awarded with the Golden Chapter gold medal award by the National Museum of History in Taiwan. In 1987, he was the first recipient of the ASEAN Cultural and Communications Award as outstanding artist. Even after his passing in 1991, he was posthumously awarded a Meritorious Service Medal for his artistic legacy. Today, many of his works are preserved and cherished in the collection of the Singapore Art

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Getting around in Kuala Lumpur is easy. The transit systems are efficient, taxis are plenty and buses are cheap. The public transportation usage peak hours are from 7am to 9am and 4.30pm to 6.30pm during the working days.

# By Transit systems

The KL monorail and LRT coaches are air-conditioned and comfortable and run from 6am to midnight. The systems are connected to each other at several points and the network covers most parts of the city. Fares range from RMO.90 to RM2.80 per single journey.

# By Taxis

Taxis are easily available at hotels or at taxi stands. Fares start at RM3 for the first kilometre and RMO.25 for every 115 metres thereon. There is a 50% surcharge on the metered fare from midnight to 6am and a baggage charge of RM2 per piece stored in the boot. There is also an additional RM1 for 3rd passenger (maximum 4 in a car). For an extra charge of RM2, you can book a taxi by phone.

# By Ecovans

Ecovans can accommodate up to 5 passengers. They serve mainly guests at major hotels and follow the fare structure of taxis but charge RM4 instead of RM2 for the first kilometre.

# By Buses

Buses serve all parts of Kuala Lumpur with fares beginning from RM1. Some hotels also offer free bus shuttle services to major shopping malls in the city.

KLIA Ekspres: The journey takes about 30 minutes from KL Sentral and the fare is RM35 per person per way. There is also check-in facility at KL Sentral for some airlines.

Taxi: The fare from the city centre to the airport is RM90 - RM120 per taxi.


Eco Transit: Eco Transit can accommodate up to 5 adults and has a fixed fare of RM130/ trip.
